FUNDS FROM FORESTRY SERVICE FOR COUNTY HIGHWAY BUILDING

Over Three Thousand Dollars Just Received As Lane County's Apportionment

It is not generally known that a considerable sum of money is turned over to Lane county each year from the government forest service, for the county's schools and public highways, but such is the case, and those who do not see the use or the good of the forestry department aside from protecting the timber from fires should sit up and take notice. County Judge Helmus W. Thompson this morning informed The Guard that the sum of \$3299.10 has just been received from the secretary of state as Lane county's apportionment from the forestry funds to be applied on the county roads. Of this sum \$1757.73 represents five per cent of land sales and \$1541.37 forest rentals.

MOTHER'S DAY COMES ON MAY EIGHTH

"Mother's Day" was first observed at Norfolk, Virginia, May 6, 1906. The object of the day is to brighten the lives of our mothers and to make them more honored, loved and protected by their children. To remind sons and daughters, especially busy, successful men and women, of the unselfish devotion of their mothers, and possibly their own selfish neglect of their parents. To ask men and children to make their mothers tell this May day, that in her children's hearts she is "Queen of the May," every person is asked to at least observe the day by wearing a white carnation on May the eighth in honor of his mother and as a badge of love and loyalty, also to help the observance of the day by giving a white flower to at least one other person. The white carnation is preferred if it can be obtained, because it may be thought to typify the mother love, its color standing for purity; its flower, beauty; its lasting qualities, faithfulness; its fragrance, love; its wide growth, charity.

Special services will be held at the Baptist church Sunday morning, May the eighth, when Pastor Wright will preach on Motherhood, special music will be rendered and all who attend will be furnished a white flower as they enter the building. Mothers who are not able to walk to the church will be brought in automobiles if the request is made known to the pastor by Saturday evening.
