After the fifth inning the Washington players seemed able to score almost at will. Oregon was saved from a shutout in the eighth, when Word walked, went to second on an infield out, and scored on Chandler's scratch hit to short, which Maguire fumbled and relayed to the plate a second too late.

Aside from this inning Pitcher Clark had the Oregon batters completely at his mercy. Word pitched a good game for the losers, striking out nine men, but poor support was given him by the infield. Several of the hits charged against him could have been cut off. Mackenzie at short having a particularly bad day.

Washington scored three in the fifth with two out, when Ted Millon, their third baseman, laced a twobag-
