Owing to the season being so far advanced it was decided not to build a cannery until next year, and have the products canned at the Eugene cannery this season. L. D. Scarborough, one of the committee appointed to attend to this matter, went to Eugene Monday to confer with the cannery officials with the result that they will handle the season's crop for the Creswell growers.—Chronicle.

GIANT POWDER EXPLODES WITH TERRIFIC FORCE

Salt Lake City, May 13.—Complete prostration of telegraph and telephone communication between this city and Ogden resulted from the explosion of a car of giant powder on a railroad siding five miles north of here at noon today. There was no loss of life.

An Oregon Short Line freight train included a car of powder which caught fire twenty miles from the scene of the explosion. The trainmen were cognizant of the danger and were prepared for the explosion when it came. Considerable damage was done to windows in the vicinity.
