FAMILY OF YOUNG MAN KILLED YESTERDAY HAS BEEN LOCATED

Coroner Gordon Receives Wire From Adam Beerman at Beardstown, Ill.

Yesterday afternoon Coroner W. T. Gordon wired to Lillian Beerman, at Beardstown, Illinois, telling her of the death of Edd Beerman, the young man who was killed night before last by falling off a Southern Pacific train near Irving, one of the post cards found in his pocket bearing her name, the coroner supposing she was his sister. This morning he received a reply from Adam Beerman, supposed to be the young man's father. The message read: "Was Edd Beerman working on train? Wire cost of shipping body here." The coroner complied with the request, and as soon as an answer comes, if he is instructed to do so, he will prepare the body for shipment to Beardstown.

An inquest was held over the remains this morning. The jury found that the man had been beating his way on the train, had fallen off, and that death was accidental.

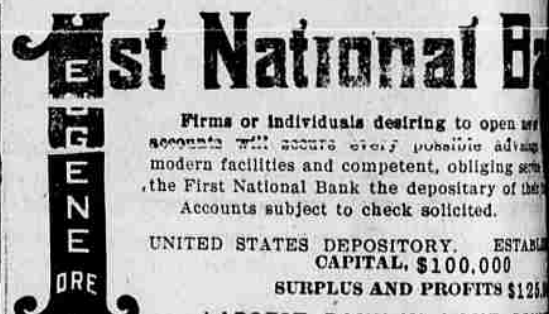
