THE DRAMA

(By William S. Brewer.)

New York, May 22.—Another newspaper man has risen from the ranks of the reportorial to find to a playwright. He is A. E. Thomas, author of "Her Husband's Wife," the latest offering at the Garrick Theatre. It is a three-act comedy in which Henry Miller plays the leading role. Hypochondriacism is the motive of the play, which is admirably suited to Mr. Miller's abilities. He is surrounded by a company of players, all of whom are well-known in New York. Laura Hope Crews is the wife and Grace Elliston the second wife-elect. Mabel Bert appears as the titled widow and Robert Warwick as the husband. Orme Caldara and Elinor McEwen complete the cast.

At the Lyric Theatre the all-star revival of "Jim the Penman" is attracting wide-spread attention. The play has not been seen in New York since 1887, a year after its introduction to English theatregoers. It is said to be partly founded upon fact, the idea having been suggested by the career of a London forger who managed to establish himself in society under false pretenses. Prominent among the players in the present revival are Willson Lackaye, who appears in the title role which he played first a number of years ago, under the Palmer management; John Mason, Theodore Roberts, Arthur Forrester, Louis Massen, Thurlow Bergen, George Barnum, Frederick Paulding, Ernest Glendinning, Florence Roberts, Marguerite Clark, Jefferey Lewis and Grace Reals. The production has been staged by Lawrence Marston.

New York, May 21.—If the members of the judiciary committee of the New York State Legislature will drop around to Union Square at three o'clock this afternoon, they will hear something to their advantage. For the given hour is the time, and Union Square the place, and the girls will be there a-plenty to tell the Solons exactly what they think of them. This may not be exactly complimentary, as the purpose of the gathering is to protest, in no uncertain terms, against the refusal of said judiciary committee to report the woman's franchise bill for which the suffragettes have been working all winter and spring.

All associations allied with the cause of votes for women will take part in the gathering. Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt will preside at one of the platforms; Mrs. Blanch, president of the Self-Supporting Equality League, at the second platform, and the third will be occupied by the Collegiate League. All present will, doubtless have an enjoyable time.

Daddy Knickerbocker will hold a land auction next Tuesday, at which about a million dollar's worth of real estate will be knocked down to the highest bidder. The plots are in six different blocks in Centre street, between White and Delancey.

The land to be sold is subject to perpetual easement for the space under the surface occupied by the subway and the station, and also the reservation by the city of the space occupied by the station entrances. But the subway has been so built that it will support a ten-story building on each of the plots.

One of the plots has been suggested as a possible site for the new county court house. This is the plot between White and Walker streets. The city owns three-quarters of the entire block and it would be necessary to buy only the remaining quarter of the block to have a large site. A county court house there would be next to the Criminal Courts building
