NEWS OF INTEREST FROM ACROSS BIG SALT POND

Guard Special Service.

London, May 27.—Although it is a week since the final services were held in connection with King Edward funeral, interest in the events immediately related to and following the beloved sovereign's death continue unabated. Every day brings crowds of visitors to London who make trips to Buckingham palace and other leading places of interest about the city. At the palace they gaze in reverence upon the mansion where the king breathed his last, some one pointing out the direction of the room in which Edward lay during his last illness. The churches, public buildings, etc., are visited to see the mourning draperies, which aside from their profusion deserve attention for their unusually artistic effect. In everything designed as a tribute to the late king, the English people have exhibited with fine spirit their reverence, love and loyalty. The thought strikes even the most casual visitor almost immediately upon arrival in the capital, which has not yet recovered from its gloom.

Much of the matter published about the new queen and her dislikes of Americans, especially American women, is piffle. No one pretends to say that Queen Mary has an overbearing fondness for Americans, but she is too liberal minded and too diplomatic to let sentiment get ahead of her act. She has the interests of her husband and his subjects at heart, and where it will foster British interests to be kind to Americans, the new queen as well as her king, will be found according them all the cordiality required.

It would not be surprising to see an anti-American war started by the Duchess of Portland and the Duchess of Buccleuch, however, when social gaffes are resumed. Both of these leaders have powerful influence in society and are close personal friends of Queen Mary. That they cherish a cordial dislike for everything American they never have attempted to deny. The Duchess of Portland has been heard to say, it is reported on good authority, that she dislikes Americans because they are "pushing, vulgar and undesirable." Americans with social ambition may rest content in the fact, however, that a large number of English women, who were favorites of the late king, will also be barred from royal favor because of their very prominence at the late court.

Politics are at a standstill, as far as any open declaration of policies is concerned, and it will probably be six months or a year before the leaders of the various parties resume any aggressive measures. Much interest is manifested, however, in impending events at Cape Town, where the new South African Union will be proclaimed next Tuesday. Lord Glad-

stone, the new governor general, has had his hands full trying to select from existing leaders the one best qualified to form the first South African executive and undertake the onerous duties pending the elections to the union parliament. The elections can not be held for three or four months and during that time the cabinet will have to refashion to some considerable extent the whole administrative system now divided between four governments. And it also will have appointments to make, patronage to dispense and precedents to lay down of supreme importance to the future character and welfare of the new dominion.

The London Spectator is waging a lively war against its contemporaries publishing racing tips. There is no denying that these tips are largely responsible for the betting evil, which has spread tremendously in England during the past few years. Mr. H. S. Rowntree, the author of a book on betting and gambling, declares that:

The practice has spread so widely among all classes of the community that those who know the facts name gambling and drinking as national evils of almost equal magnitude. There is no doubt that the social conscience is as yet only partially awakened to the widespread character of the gambling evil and to its grievous consequences. Like a cancer, the evil thing has spread its poisonous roots throughout the length and breadth of the land, carrying with them, where they strike, misery, poverty, weakened character and crime.

At a time when the shortage and the high price of cotton are seriously affecting the textile industry any cheap substitute for cotton is likely to find a ready market. A company is about to be formed for the purpose of manufacturing yarn from marine fibre and wood pulp. There is practically an inexhaustible supply of marine fibre at the bottom of the ocean, big deposits, about nine feet in thickness, lying in shallow water in Spencer's and St. Vincent's gulfs in South Australia.

Experiments have just been concluded in which this material, with a mixture of wood pulp, has been made into yarn, and the results have given satisfaction. The fibre is declared to be already deglutinized by the process of nature, to be unshrinkable and to be easy to bleach and dye. It can be used for all purposes for which cotton is used.

A feature of Colonel Roosevelt's program which will be carried out as originally planned is his visit to Chequers Court, Buckinghamshire, where he goes tomorrow to be the guest of Arthur H. Lee over the week-end. Captain Lee was military attache at the American army during the Cuban war.

SANTIAM WATER IS URGED ON SALEM

Engineer Whistler Recommends Gravity System With Filter Plant

Salem, Or., May 27.—In an extensive report containing estimates and recommendations for the installation of a pure water system in this city, John T. Whistler, an expert hydraulic engineer, hired by Mayor Rodgers, recommends that gravity system be constructed from the little North Fork of the Santiam river, with a filter plant. On account of a general public sentiment here against water obtained from any polluted source, Mr. Whistler believes this to be the most advisable. The report will be submitted to the city council for their approval next Monday evening, and Mayor Rodgers is desirous of having the water question settled at the earliest date possible.
