DUD CLARKE SIGNS WITH TACOMA TEAM

Star Player at University of Oregon to Enter Professional Ranks.

Dudley Clarke, the premier batsman of the University of Oregon baseball team and the all-Northwest champion football fullback, is to don a Tacoma uniform as soon as he graduates in June.

In securing Clarke, Manager Quinn has slipped something big over every Northwest League manager. It is known that Walter McCredie of Portland has had his weather eye on Clarke ever since the big fellow was attending the Portland Academy. At that time "Big Dud" was playing right field because he couldn't catch a balloon, but he was leading the Intercollegiate League in batting, and P. A. practically won the pennant on his stickwork the last year he was in preparatory school.

Four years ago he entered the University and since then he has been a leading all-round athlete as well as a high-standing student. He has won points for his track team by juggling the weights and he has won both football and baseball games through his terrific power in booting the pigskin and clouting the horsehide. Instead of continuing to play right field Clarke developed into one of the fastest shortstops in Northwest collegiate circles and for three years the big fellow cavorted around that position. This year, however, Oregon needed his speed in the outfield and Dud has played center.

There is no doubt that Clarke could go to Manager McCredie and sign a contract any day after he graduates if he wanted to, for he is as popular with the fans as sunshine in June and there isn't a sportsman in Oregon that isn't proud of the big fellow and what he has done.

Be it said here, though, that to E. Quinn goes none of the credit for landing D. Clarke. Curtiss Coleman, Quinn's crack young third sacker, is also a University of Oregon man. "Curt" played second to Clarke's shortstop and both of them are members of the Kappa Sigma Fraternity.

PENNSYLVANIA WON INTERCOLLEGIATE MEET

Philadelphia, May 30.—The University of Pennsylvania won the intercollegiate meet on Franklin field Saturday by the narrow margin of two points, scoring 27½ points to Yale's 25½.

Michigan, through the fine work of her sprinter, R. C. Craig, took third place from Princeton, scoring 20 points. Princeton made 17 points. Cornell 14, Harvard 13½, Syracuse 8, Amherst 6, Brown and Dartmouth each 3, Columbia 2½, Wesleyan, Bowdoin and New York University each 1.

The world's record in the 220-yard dash, 21.1 seconds, held by Walters of Georgetown, was equaled by Craig of Michigan, and the intercollegiate pole vault record of 12 feet 3 inches, held by Campbell of Yale, was raised to 12 feet 4 inches by Nelson of Yale.

The championships were not decided until the final event, the 220-yard dash, was run off. Before this sprint, Yale's points were 25½, or three more than Pennsylvania's. Craig, of Michigan, Ramsdell and Minda, of Pennsylvania, Robson, of Wesleyan, and Cooke, of Princeton, tied the scratch for this event.

Craig took the lead, and Ramsdell, who had defeated him in the 100-yard dash, could not catch him. Ramsdell took second place and Minda third, giving Pennsylvania five points and topping Yale's score by two.

The hurdling of Gardner, of Harvard, in the 220-yard event, helped to put Yale out of the championship. Christolm, of Yale, was looked upon as a likely winner in this event.

Nelson Clever at Pole Vault
As usual, Yale excelled in the pole vault. Nelson gave a great exhibition of vaulting. After winning the event at 12 feet 4 inches, he tried for a world's record at 12 feet 10½ inches. He got over the bar, but in coming down his elbow struck the cross piece, much to the dismay of 15,000 persons who were spectators.

MANY OLD AUTO RECORDS SMASHED

Indianapolis, May 30.—In desperate struggles for supremacy among drivers of the most powerful American cars, records went down for all distances between five and 200 miles at the Indianapolis speedway Saturday, and in the merciless grind only two men were injured.

Herbert Lytle, the driver, and his mechanic, William Clifton, were hurled from their car, an American. When a front tire burst as they were turning into the home stretch in the last lap of the 10-mile free-for-all handicap, Lytle's left leg was broken and Clifton was badly bruised.

Harroun's Drive Sensational
Harroun, driving the Marmon, achieved a sensational triumph when he won the 200-mile race in 2:46:21, breaking the record which had been held by Chevrolet, who went the distance in 2:46:48 at Atlanta. The performance of Lynch, in a Jackson, who was second, was hardly less brilliant, for he did not stop once, while Harroun paused at the end of the 100th mile for gasoline.

The five-mile record for cars of 451 to 600 cubic inches piston displacement was broken by Barney Oldfield and his Knox. Time 4:03. The old time was 4:32.

Altken (National), broke the record for ten miles for cars of 301 to 450 inches displacement. His time was 8:08 against the former record of 8:17. Harroun (Marmon) and Merz (National) were close second and third.

CHEMAWA RUNNERS DEFEAT Y. M. C. A.

For the fourth time the Chemawa Indians defeated athletes from the Portland Y. M. C. A. in the Salem-Portland relay race, finishing the long course Saturday afternoon at 2:30:25, 13 minutes ahead of the last Portland runner, and demonstrating beyond all doubt their superiority as long distance runners over trained white men.

Ben Berchid, bearing on his back the banner "Chemawa's Fourth Victory" concluded the relay for Chemawa. He is only 15 years old, but acknowledged to be one of the speediest Indian runners ever turned out in the Northwest.
