Marshfield, Or., May 31.—A franchise has been granted to the Coos Bay Rapid Transit Company by the City Council of North Bend for an electric line. The franchise for Marshfield was secured some time ago. The company proposes to build a line between the two cities, extending back some distance from the bay and opening a territory not now reached by streets. Ralls have been ordered.

This dispatch from the Portland Oregonian is of interest here, because the Lane County Asset Company has a contract to enter the Coos bay towns over the tracks of the Rapid Transit Company, and are also guaranteed terminal facilities by the company. Construction work is now being prosecuted by the Rapid Transit Company on a street railway and belt line around Coos bay, Major Kinney, the head of the enterprise, being backed by a syndicate of Cleveland, Ohio, capitalists.
