PORTLAND UNION STOCK YARDS BULLETIN

General Conditions of Livestock Market—Hog Market Much Improved.

Portland, Or., June 2.—Please take notice that "North Portland" is the post office address of the Union Stock Yards Company, the various commission firms doing business here and the Portland Live Stock Reporter. The post office is located in the Exchange building at the stock yards.

Plans are under way looking to the giving of a fat stock show in March, 1911. Beef cattle, fat sheep, hogs and draft horses in harness will constitute the classes. Save out something good for this show; it will be worth while.

Receipts at this market for the month of May were 7452 cattle, 18,052 sheep, 10,057 hogs and 152 horses. As compared with the receipts of a year ago there was an increase of 1430 cattle, 1133 hogs, 5073 sheep. There has been a decline in prices all along the line, but it has been slight, and compared with the central markets on the Missouri river, North Portland shows up to a big advantage.

Cattle has gone off 50 to 75 cents during the month. The bulk of the supplies have been from California points, and the quality has been good. It has been a sellers' market and buyers have had to pay stronger prices than would have prevailed if quantity or quality had permitted.

The sheep market was fairly steady at the end of the month at the heavy decline that took place in the beginning days. There was a feeling of uncertainty as to sheep values, but prices were tobogganed about \$2 per hundred and at this writing price and demand are steady.

The hog market is slower in comparison, but the demand is brisk and while prices are off 15 to 25 cents this market is \$1 to \$1.25 higher than Omaha. Livestock shippers of this country can be congratulated on the general strength of their market at "North Portland."

Taking the market all in all it has grown in strength each day since it opened for business, and the system of grading livestock, selling on a fill instead of a shrink and the competition afforded by the presence of a number of regular buyers have met with approval of a great majority of the live stock shippers of the Pacific Northwest.

The business of swine raising has received a great impetus since the establishment of this market, and all over Oregon, Washington and Idaho the farmers are realizing that their best possible opportunity for money-making lies in an increased production of hogs. Field peas, root crops, milo maize, gaffir corn and other forage crops are coming in for attention and the assurance that for years the supply cannot catch up with the demand is a great incentive.

Jeffries made this statement today when he was shown an interview sent out by a news agency from Chicago quoting Governor Gillett as saying the Jeffries-Johnson fight was a "fake," and arranged for the white man to win. Jeffries was hurt and angry over the matter. "I cannot believe," he said, "that Gillett has been truthfully quoted. I don't believe he ever said a word against the fight, but if he did it was uncalled for and untrue. You boys who have seen me working up here must know that my heart and soul are in the coming fight, and it doesn't stand to reason I would break my neck if it was all settled for me to win."

"I wonder what I have done in the ring or any other walk to be accused of crookedness. I quit the fight game only because I did not care for those connected with it or the knockers who were continually rasping, and now this story has come. It's enough to break a man up."

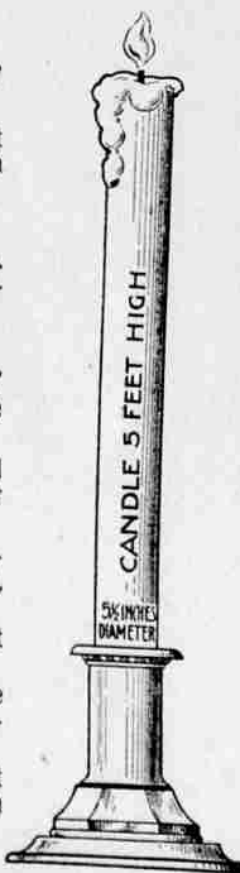
