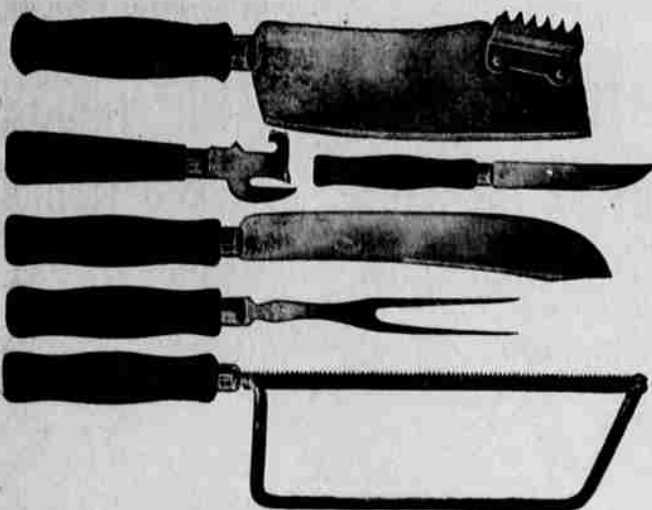

AVERAGE SALARY OF PASTORS BUT \$663

Census Bureau Has Prepared Interesting Statistics Concerning Ministry. According to compilations made by the census bureau, the average annual salary of a minister of the gospel is but \$663 in all the denominations figuring in the report on the first effort made in the United States to secure official statistics concerning salaries paid to ministers. The report, which will shortly be published, it is stated, is not entirely satisfactory to the chiefs of the census, on account of the failure of some ministers to report their salary and others to report with sufficient clearness.

Of the grand total of 186 denominations in continental United States, the report states that fifteen have no regular ministry and sixty-nine either pay no stated salaries or made returns which were not sufficiently complete to warrant tabulation. The denomination showing the highest average is the Unitarian, with \$1,653, which the denominations next in order are the Protestant Episcopal church \$1,242; the Universalists, \$1,238; the General Convention of the New Jerusalem in the United States of America, \$1,233; the Jewish congregations, \$1,222; the Presbyterian church in the United States of America, \$1,177; the Reformed Church in America, \$1,170; the United Presbyterian church of North America, \$1,096; the Congregationalists, \$1,042; the Christian Catholic church in Zion, \$1,037; and the Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian church of North America, \$1,008.

FIFTY THOUSAND COLONISTS CAME

During the brief period between March 1 and April 15, this Spring, between 40,000 and 50,000 colonists, according to the various railroad managers, found new homes in the Pacific Northwest, in California and in Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Utah, Colorado, Oregon and Wyoming. The Spring movement of colonists is regarded as having broke the record of the Spring of 1909 by from 15 to 20 per cent. With the exception of figures which were prepared by the management of the Harriman lines, all figures of the colonist movement into the Northwest are estimates. The figures presented by the Harriman lines may be regarded as conservative estimates and as being close to the actual movement.

DOUGLAS REPUBLICANS WANT NO ASSEMBLY

Roseburg, Or., June 4.—All likelihood of holding a republican assembly in Douglas county vanished today, when Chairman Alley, of the convention, called for this afternoon, observed that not a single delegate from precincts outside of Roseburg was present. An effort will be made to hold the assembly next Saturday, but it is hardly probable that the meeting will materialize, as few precincts have elected delegates. In some instances it is said the call was wholly ignored.

BENSON DENIES CURRENT RUMOR

Discloses That His Brother Will Not Take Place in Politics

San Francisco, June 4.—"Absolutely nothing in the political story," said Governor Benson, of Oregon, when he was asked tonight as to the truth of a story that he is to retire from the fight for the office of Secretary of State and that his brother, H. L. Benson, is to seek the nomination for Governor. "I haven't even heard of the story before, and usually those yarns travel very fast. No, I can say that the story is utterly without foundation."

Governor Benson added that if all goes well with him he may be able to leave for Oregon in two weeks. He has just completed an X-ray treatment, and if his nose continues to improve he will not have to take further treatment at the hands of the local specialists. It is possible, however, that he will have to take another X-ray treatment, in which case he would be detained in San Francisco for five or six weeks. Dr. Steiner, who is visiting the governor, but not participating in the treatment of the case, says that he came to San Francisco on a business connection with a seating plant, and that he intends returning to Salem in two or three days.
