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HAWKINS WILL

CAPTAIN TRACK TEAM

Martin Hawkins, of Portland, the wonderful young athlete whose performances on the cinder path have been a feature of the intercollegiate track season in the Northwest, will captain the University of Oregon track squad for next year. At a meeting of members of the team yesterday he was elected to the coveted position by the margin of a single vote over Robert Kellogg, of Baker City, the votes standing 7 to 6.

Hawkins' work in the 120-yard high hurdles has been the sensation of the Northwest track season. After running in poor form at the first two meets at Seattle and Berkeley, Calif., he struck his stride and first set a new Northwest record of 15 3-5 seconds, then equalled the world record of 15 1-5 seconds for the event. He is 22 years old, a sophomore and member of the Kappa Kappa Gamma fraternity.

Kellogg was also one of the team's stars, his specialty being in the weights. He was Oregon's highest and most consistent point winner during the season, making 43 points to 27 for Hawkins. With Trainer "Bill" Hayward planning to come back again next season, Oregon's chances for a successful year of it are unusually bright.

JUNCTION CITY DEFEATS ALBANY, 8 TO 7

Schermer, who hurried them down the alley for Junction, was there all the time, keeping what hits Albany did get well scattered, and besides striking out fourteen men. Zoomey, of Eugene, caught him and played a good game throughout, also slugging out the needed hit in the eleventh. Junction hit the ball well, tying the score in the ninth by clean base hitting, and winning in the eleventh by their superb batting.

Breaks Bike Record.

Albany, N. Y., June 6.—Joseph Noe, of Jersey City, clipped 50 minutes off a record yesterday by riding a bicycle from the New York City Hall to the capital at Albany, a distance of 171 miles, in 10 hours and 21 minutes. The best previous record was made by Lewis Bailey, of Poughkeepsie, on October 21, 1909, in 11 hours and 11 minutes. Noe broke six spokes at one point on the way, but did not stop to repair them. At Hinderhook he ran into a shower and the last four miles of the journey was made in a heavy rainstorm. He returned to New York today.

Spitball is Unsanitary.

New York, June 6.—The Interboro Baseball League, a small association of amateur and semi-professional organization in and around New York City, has voted that its pitchers may not use the spitball. This action is taken, it is said, because the spitball is unsanitary.

BIG PULP MILL FOR GARDINER, OREGON

Marshfield, Or., June 7.—A big pulp mill which will employ more men than most any other manufacturing plant in the state is reported to have been located at Gardiner on the Umpqua river. It is said that Senator Jones of Massachusetts, who is representing eastern capitalists, and Warren P. Reed of Gardiner, are the ones at the head of the project. The report is that all arrangements have been made and that the mill will be started soon. It will, of course, be a great help to Gardiner. The place now has only a few hundred inhabitants. It is on the Umpqua river a few miles from the mouth and is only reached by stage for passenger travel. The mill of the Gardiner Mill Company, a fish cannery and a creamery are about the only industries.
