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## AMERICAN FEAR OF MONEY

Capital is shy of taxation—not of the equitable and legiti-  
 mate assessment, but of the squeeze. The town that invites capi-  
 tal to build and operate factories, gas plants, trolley lines and  
 other factors of development, and then sets a trap to pinch them,  
 will never get a feather. No corporation considers itself legiti-  
 mate prey for taxation, nor should it. Suspicion against capital  
 is another feature entirely American. It is said in an article in  
 a recent issue of the New York Post that when Mr. Rockefeller  
 asks congress for an act to facilitate the bestowal of his large  
 fortune in charity, the tocsin of alarm is rung by many goose-  
 fleshed hands. "It is," declares the statesmanly observer,  
 "only an an insidious attempt to get control of the charitable  
 and educational institutions of the country in the interests of the  
 trusts." Others can see in it a cunning plan to perpetuate the  
 Standard Oil monopoly, or even to set up an oligarchic govern-  
 ment by the irresistible power of the foundation's money. To  
 these many apprehensive minds wealth is an unfettered hawk  
 and the United States a mere clucking hen. The simple words  
 "two hundred million dollars," make their hair stand on end.  
 This fear of money is one of the characteristics of the American

people, and especially of American municipalities, many of  
 which, inviting capital, find themselves in a contradictory situ-  
 ation.

## THE DEVIL DOES EXIST

According to advices received by the New York Sun from  
 Budapest, Hungary, the devil does exist, the school teachers of
