County Judge Thompson and Commissioners Price and Edwards were taken over on the McKenzie this afternoon to view the proposed T. E. Seavey and E. Weldon roads, which are to be located near Seavey's ferry.

Eugene people writing from Portland say that the crowds are thick in the streets here that it is almost impossible to board a street car on the business thoroughfares. The crowds

are said to be the largest ever seen in the metropolis.

Whipple S. Hall, of Oakland, Calif., the aviator who will make a number of flights here Saturday and Sunday, arrived in the city this morning, accompanied by his manager. The machine is also here and will be given a number of tests before the flights are made.

The artesian well that was discovered on a lot of Geo. Melvin Miller in City View Park yesterday is still flowing a steady stream through an inch and a half pipe. The water raises three and a half feet above the ground. The well was bored on the side of the hill.

The last meeting of the student body of the University for the school year is being held this afternoon. Amendments to the constitution are being voted on, presentation of the "O" to athletes is being made, and the new officers are being installed. Percy Collier, the new president, is on the program for a speech.

In the circuit court case of William Brown vs. Dr. C. W. Southworth, in which Brown secured a judgment against the doctor for killing Brown's pet wolf, a statement was filed today in which the defendant is declared as having no property which is applicable to the payment of the judgment.

Mrs. Rena Gaby was today appointed administratrix of the estate of her husband, Claude Gaby, who was drowned a few days ago. The estimated value of the property left by

tent of the devastation. In this city little harm was done, and only one death is reported. The population, however, is terror-stricken.
Twenty are reported killed at Calitri, which is said to have been badly damaged. The situation there is distressing. Squads of workmen, together with soldiers dispatched from this place, are working to assist the suffering villagers. It was in the darkest hour of the morning when the shock was felt here. In a moment panic had seized the 20,000 inhabitants, who live in daily fear of seismic disaster. There was a mad rush for the squares and open places outside the city. In the squares hundreds threw themselves upon their faces and implored mercy from the Almighty. There were processions to the shrine of St. Andrew, the protector of the town, and others climbed to the sanctuary of Monte Vargine. After several hours a semblance of quiet was restored.
