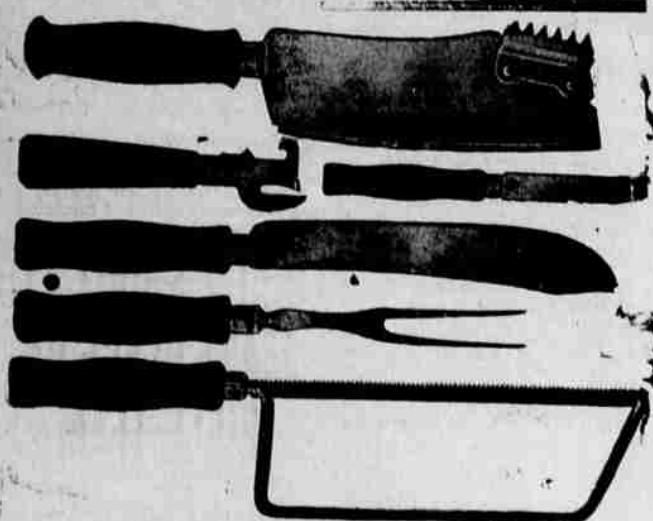

Seattle, Wash., June 8.—The English stage coach which Harry Whitney Trett, the millionaire, has been driving each day during the past week between Hotel Washington and the golf links, carrying society women, was held up today on a trip to the club by four masked and heavily armed men, who obtained \$7,500.00 worth of valuables from the women passengers and handled them roughly.

The holdup turned out later to have been planned by the husbands of some of the women, and was far more successful than the jokers had planned. The rings and jewelry were later returned to the women at the golf club. The members of the "bandit gang" were identified later as Joshua Green, the millionaire steamship man; John W. Eddy, the wealthy lumberman; Captain Brydson and a water-front character known as "Red" Gleason. Green declared that Trett was in their plans and his confusion at the time of the holdup was all assumed.

TAFT SHUTS DOOR ON F. B. HARRISON

Angry at Being Credited With
Evil Motives—Refuses to
to See Traducer

Washington, June 9.—President Taft today declined to receive Representative Francis Burton Harrison (Dem.), of New York, who called at the White House in company with two other representatives to introduce a number of Jewish rabbis who took up with the president the question of the expulsion of Jews from Russia.

The president received the delegation and chatted with its various members for 15 minutes, or more. Representative Goldfogel, of New York, acted as spokesman for the party, and so adroitly had the situation been handled by Secretary Norton that not one of the callers knew of the incident until Mr. Harrison returned to the capitol and there stated that he had been rebuffed by the president.

Harrison charged wrong-doing. Mr. Taft based his refusal to see Mr. Harrison on statements attributed by newspapers to the representative in connection with the resolutions introduced in the house calling on Attorney-General Wickersham for full information on the connection of his office with the Ballinger-Pinchot episode.

Mr. Harrison, according to the White House version of the matter, charged the president and attorney-general with having wilfully attempted to mislead congress in the back-dating of the attorney-general's summary of the Glavis charges.

Mr. Harrison was first quoted as having said that he could assign no reason for the president's action today. He made the engagement with the president some ten days ago, and had received no intimation that his presence at the White House was undesirable.

POSTAL BANK BILL PASSED BY HOUSE

Caucus Measure Has Big Majority—Republicans
All in Line

Washington, June 9.—By the overwhelming majority of 195 to 101, the house tonight passed the postal savings bank bill as recently agreed upon by the Republican caucus of the house. Not a single Republican voted against the measure on the final roll call.

Prior to this action the house, by 113 to 196, rejected the Democratic substitute for the bill.

The vote upon the several motions involved in the measure followed six hours of debate, in which many Republicans and Democrats recorded their views upon the bill of the majority and the substitute, supported by a large portion of the minority.

Democrats Out of Line
The large defection among the Democrats was shown when the Democratic senate bill was voted on, 21 of them joining the Republicans in voting against the measure.

Most of these were opposed to a postal savings bank of any kind. These Democrats were Brantly, of Georgia; Broussard, of Louisiana; Burgess, of Texas; Carlin, of Virginia; Flood, of Virginia; Foss, of Massachusetts; Garrett, of Tennessee; Gill, of Maryland; Gillespie, of Texas; Hammond, of Minnesota; Harrison, of New York; Hay, of Virginia; Jameson, of Iowa; Korby, of Indiana; Lamb, of Virginia; Latta, of Nebraska; McHenry, of Pennsylvania; Moon, of Tennessee; Sladden, of Texas; Talbott, of Maryland, and Turnbull, of Virginia.

On the Republican side Norris, of Nebraska, "insurgent," was the only member who voted with the Democrats for their substitute.
