Who are investors?

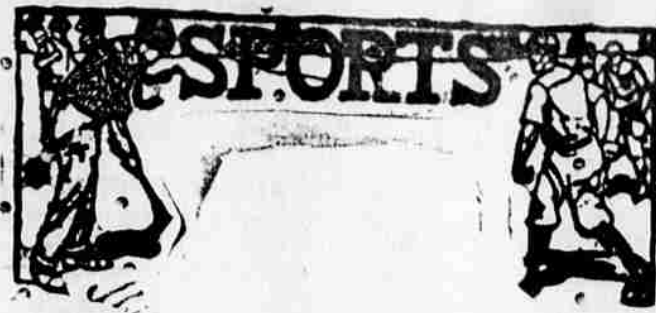

JEFFRIES NOT READY TO BOX CORBETT

Ben Lomond, Cal., June 9.—Once again Jim Jeffries did not live up to his programme, and for the fourth time the initial boxing bee between the big fellow and "Gentleman Jim" Corbett was unexpectedly postponed today.

The open-air ring, an exact copy of the one in which Jeffries and Johnson will settle the championship on July 4, had received the final touch, Corbett on hand and everything ready except Jeffries, who took a sudden notion that he wanted to go fishing and fishing he did, accompanied by a party of friends.

The most keenly disappointed of the large number of camp visitors on hand were a bunch of eastern newspaper men, several of whom had traveled across the continent and expected to get a line on Jeffries in his boxing bout with Corbett today.

Jeffries left in the morning and promised to return by noon, so many of the visitors to the camp waited, but the big fellow forgot his promise or found fishing so good that he decided to make a day of it and did not return until tonight.

The real reason why Jeffries has been reluctant to do more boxing this week is no doubt a slightly sprained thumb. An effort has been made to keep this quiet and to attribute the frequent postponing of the sparring with Corbett to Jeffries' whims, but the fact remains that the big fellow injured his thumb a

week ago and has done no boxing since. Trainer Cornell declared that the thumb is healing, but Jeffries apparently has been unwilling to take chances with it.

JACK JOHNSON BOXES KAUFMAN

San Francisco, June 9.—Jack Johnson has always been a systematic worker, but this afternoon he caught some of the newspaper men napping, and incidentally they missed a real treat.

Without any intention of putting on the gloves, the colored champion strolled into the big pavilion in the afternoon where Al Kaufman was working, and, at the request of some of Kaufman's friends, decided to do a little work himself. He wrestled around with the medicine ball to warm himself up, and then finished up with fast boxing with Al Kaufman.

Kaufman, as the world knows, is a big fellow well able to stand a lot of punishment, and Johnson had the best work of his training seige. His trainers were delighted with his performance, and Johnson himself became enthusiastic.

Pugilist Grows Enthusiastic
"It was great," he said, "the best work that I have had since camp opened. It gives a chance to extend myself, and I will do a lot of boxing with Al."

MOUNT MCKINLEY IS EASILY SCALED Two Trips to Summit Are Made by a Party of Three

Fairbanks, Alaska, June 8.—Pete Anderson, W. R. Taylor and Charles McGonigle, who were with Tom Lloyd when he reached the summit of Mount McKinley, April 3, arrived at Fairbanks today with the announcement that they climbed the mountain a second time, reaching the summit May 17. They corroborate in every detail the story of the first ascent as told by Lloyd.

These men did not return to Fairbanks with Lloyd in April, but remained at Katsilna in the foothills of the mountains. At the request of Lloyd they retraced their steps up the mountainside to take more photographs to be used as proofs to be submitted to the committee of the Order of Pioneers of Alaska, appointed to investigate Lloyd's story.

It took the men a month to attain the summit over the trail staked by the party on the first ascent. Upon reaching the summit May 17 they found the flag left there six weeks before intact and the flagstaff firmly planted in the rocks that had been left around it. The climbers left provisions in camps along the trail for use of any party that wishes to verify their story by taking the route followed by them.

Prospectors just returning from the vicinity of Mount McKinley bring additional verifications of the stories told by Lloyd and his associates. They say that the flag is plainly visible from the foothills. The Northern Commercial Company's agent at Kuskokwim says that the flag on the summit of Mount McKinley is also visible from that side of the mountain.
