DEATH CAR RAISED. NO BODIES FOUND IN THE SLOUGH

Only Two People in Auto Wreck is Latest Theory—Day and Woman to Total Dead

Portland, June 13.—Battered and broken almost beyond recognition, a seven-passenger touring car, brought to the surface of Oregon Slough, was the only result of yesterday's search for the victims of Friday night's tragic automobile accident. No bodies were recovered.

Establishing beyond a doubt that there were but two people in the car at the time it shot over the bridge to destruction, and that these were Frisco Day and Mabel Monto, the statement yesterday of Patrolman Portwood, stationed on the Burnside bridge, did much to clear up the mystery. Officer Portwood makes a positive statement that the automobile carrying these two people alone crossed the Burnside bridge at 11:20 p. m. Friday night, bound for Vancouver.

Policeman Stops Car
"At Fourth and Burnside streets, a few minutes before 11 o'clock, I saw Day and 'Monte' going towards town in a big machine," said Portwood yesterday afternoon. "About twenty minutes later they came back and started across the Burnside bridge. I halted them, for one of the headlights was very dim, and I made Day light it up. As I knew both Day and the girl, I talked with them for a few minutes.

"They were both very drunk, and I warned the girl that it would be better for her not to attempt to ride behind Day, in view of the fact that he was so much under the influence of liquor. She answered that she was a little afraid of the fellow, but was in a hurry to go to Vancouver, and wanted to catch the last ferry. She said she was having a very good time. Then Day drove ahead and I haven't seen either of them since."

"I am positive, however, that there was no one else in the machine but the driver and the girl. If any other persons were killed in the accident, they must have got in the car on the East Side, for Day would not have had time to drive into the city again."

Positive identification of the car pulled up yesterday as the one which was driven by Frisco Day was obtained from Mrs. H. M. Green, the owner, and Ed Hollenbeck, at whose garage the machine was stabled. All attempts to locate Day and Mabel Monto have proved fruitless, and it is certain that they lost their lives.

Careful inquiry yesterday failed to disclose any other persons who might be missing. The authorities have followed up every clue and have come to the conclusion that there were but two persons in the machine. It was reported during the morning that two women associates of Mabel Monto in Vancouver were missing,

but investigation showed this not to be true.

2000 Watch Wreck
Fully 2000 people watched the operations of the diver and the tug yesterday morning, being stationed at every possible point of vantage along the bank of the slough and the edge of the trestle. It is estimated that altogether 10,000 people visited the place during the day, notwithstanding the fact that absolutely no work was done after noon.

It was a typical throng of sensation seekers, and a great part of them were women. Some were chauffeurs who had known Frisco Day in this city. From 7 o'clock yesterday morning, when Sheriff Stevens and deputies first arrived at the scene of accident, until late in the evening, there was a steady stream of people flocking to the bridge. The trestle became so congested within a short time that it was necessary to rope off the way 500 feet on each side where the work was going on.

DEMENTED MAN WORKS THE CITY OF ALBANY

John White, An Aged Man From Eugene, Slept in the City Jail Last Night

John White, of Eugene, who has been in Albany for a few days, went to Chief of Police Munkers last night, pleading that he was "broke" and requesting that he might be given an apartment in the city jail for the night, which was willingly granted as he had the appearance and demeanor of a tramp.

This morning he was taken before Recorder P. M. Redfield and searched. Nine dollars in cash and two drafts, one for one hundred dollars and the other for seven hundred were found on him. He is seventy years of age and from his actions it is judged that he is slightly demented. Policeman Munkers sent him to the sheriff of Lane county this noon.—Albany Herald.

MAN TIED TO TREE IS BURNED ALIVE Horrible Vengeance Deal Out to Parish Landholder in Louisiana by Enemies

Lake Charles, La., June 11.—Tied to a tree and practically cremated alive by his enemies was the fate of James Perkins, a wealthy planter, it developed today, shortly after he died. Perkins was found in a pine thicket near his home a few miles from here last night by a party of searchers. He was unconscious and apparently dead from horrible burns that had seared every inch of surface flesh. He was removed to his home and for an instant he survived. He refused to tell the names of the men who had burned him, declaring he would live to avenge his own ill treatment. He became unconscious again, but just before he died he revived and attempted to tell the names of his persecutors. Death balked him.

Victim is Wealthy
From evidence discovered about Perkins' death here it appears that he was captured by his enemies and bound to a tree in the thicket; then his clothes were saturated with oil and a flame applied. Before the green ropes were burned, Perkins had sustained a fatal scorching. Some time ago Perkins had trouble with squatters. Parish officials have had to make arrests among them.

Perkins was well known in western Louisiana and eastern Texas. He had big land holdings and was wealthy.
