JEWISH MASSACRE

FEARED AS RESULT OF EXPULSION ORDER

Ordered to Leave by June 14—Many Have Not Observed the Warning Given

St. Petersburg, June 13.—Reports received here from Kiev and other centers of anti-Jewish agitation have given rise to grave fears that a massacre will result if any Hebrews ordered to leave have failed to do so before the time limit of the decree of expulsion expires tomorrow. A month ago the Jews residing illegally in Kiev were given until June 14 to leave, and it is supposed that a majority have heeded the warning, but it is alleged that not a few remain.
 The order of expulsion was issued as a result of an agitation which began in the Duma, and originally provided that the expulsion should take place on April 23 last. Subsequently the order was suspended by Premier Stolypin to permit a further examination of Jewish claims of residence. The order applied to other cities and towns where Jews are residing without the pale, and local commissions were appointed to revise the list of those affected by the order, with the expectation that a large proportion would be allowed to remain undisturbed.

The Kiev commission considered about 1,000 cases, of which 550 were found to be subject to expulsion. The governor-general reviewed the decisions of the commission and confirmed the expulsion of 700 of those enlisted.

The Jews remaining in Kiev will be allowed to occupy summer villas outside the city only through special permission granted in individual cases.

The order of expulsion applies not only to Kiev, but to the entire section of the empire constituting Great Russia, which comprises all of the central provinces. From time immemorial the Jews have rigorously excluded from this territory. Nevertheless through a relaxation of government surveillance, through bribery of minor officials and through abuse of certain individual privileges granted to certain classes, industrial centers within the forbidden territory, particularly Moscow, Kiev, Nijni-Novgorod, St. Petersburg and Tiflis, have seen large colonies of Jews grow and developed within their borders.

The government recently took alarm at the growth in commercial and political influence of these scattered settlements and decided upon the strict enforcement of the original segregation law, which restricts the territory habitable by Jews to the Polish provinces and the Ukraine or little Russia.

The number of Jews within this pale is estimated at 5,000,000. The number without the pale is said to be less than 100,000.

Of these, at least 25,000 will be compelled to abandon the residence likely maintained in the prohibited section. The others will be permitted to remain through certain dispensations.
