ANNUAL SHOOT OF OREGON NATIONAL GUARD

**Eugene Will Send Two Teams
to the Clackamas
Range**

The annual rifle competition of
the Oregon National Guard will take
place July 12 to 14 on the new rifle
range at Clackamas station, near
Oregon City. Every company of
guardsmen in the state will be rep-
resented by a team composed of its
best shots. The program prepared by
Adjutant General Finzer provides for
five big events, four for riflemen and
one for pistol shots. In addition to
these events which will be exclusiv-
ely for members of the guard, there
are to be three competitions under
the auspices of the Oregon state rifle
association, which civilians may en-
ter.

Portland will furnish six teams,
one from each company of the
guardsmen stationed there; Eugene
will send two teams, and one team
will come from each of the following
interior points: Astoria, Salem, Al-
bany, Baker City, Pendleton and
Woodburn. By far the most import-
ant competition is the state trophy
match. This match was won last year
by a team from the Cottage Grove
company, and it is understood that
Captain Johnson, commander of this
company, is confident that his team
will again win the trophy. Under the
rules governing this competition, it
must be won three straight years be-
fore it becomes the property of any
one company.

Picked squads of eight men from
each of the two regiments will con-
test for the governor's trophy. This
trophy has been won for the past two
years by the Fourth regiment.

The match which will determine
who is the best shot in the state Na-
tional Guard will be the hardest
fought contest of the competitive
meet. This contest, which is known
as the state individual, is expected to
bring out a large number of con-
testants. In this match, as in the reg-
imental contest, the ranges will be
200 yards at rapid fire and 600
and 100 yards at slow fire, and in ad-
dition there will be the usual skir-
mish run. General Finzer, who will
himself serve as executive officer of
the camp, has not yet selected the
camp and range officers.

C. A. WHITE'S PAST WILL BE PROBED

**Accused Lawmaker's Attorney
Will Grill Witness—Home
of White Is Visited**

Chicago, June 12.—An intimate
inside story of the workings of the
various cliques that make up the leg-
islature is to be drawn from Charles
A. White, the lawmaker, whose con-
fession brought about the present sen-
atorial scandal when he submits to
cross examination at the hands of
Representative Lee O'Neill, Browne's
opponent. If the plans of the accused
legislator's attorneys work out, White
may be compelled to add details to
his confession that he never intended
should see the light of day.

New Details to Come Out.
After a conference in the offices of
Attorney Charles A. Erbstein in the
First National bank building, which
was not concluded until sunrise to-
day, Representative Browne's counsel
considered themselves ready to "tear
that White to pieces." The tearing
process, however, will be confined to
personal matters in which White is
declared to have been connected —
the last session of the legislature —
matters that he did not mention in
the first detailed confession of the
bribe offer he insists was made to
him and carried out by Representa-
tive Browne.

It was learned during the day that
every detail of White's life as a labor
leader in East St. Louis and as a leg-
islator has been subjected to a search-
ing scrutinizing during the past few
weeks and that his cross-examination
will consume considerably longer
than the direct examination during
which he will repeat his charges
against Browne.

Witnesses May Be Excluded.
The finishing touches were put on
this investigation by Attorney Pat-
rick O'Donnell who made a hurried
trip to White's old haunts in South-
ern Illinois, Friday, returning today
Browne is basing his hopes on the
fact that his lawyers will make a de-
termined fight to exclude the testi-
mony of Representatives H. J. C.
Heckemeyer and Michael Link on the
ground that they did not witness the
financial transaction declared to have
taken place between Browne and
White. Should the testimony of these
two men be ruled out and White's
story be discredited by bringing up
other stories in which he will be pic-
tured in an unfavorable light, it is
hoped to leave his charge of bribery
without sufficient corroboratory evi-
dence to make a case.

It was said that Attorney William
S. Forrest had changed his plans and
would not make an opening state-
ment awaiting the conclusion of the
case of the prosecution to make this
address. In the event that this plan
is carried out White will take the
witness-stand before 12 o'clock Mon-
day.
