SPRINGFIELD

NO WAGE GRAFT

AT SPRINGFIELD

Springfield, June 15.—There is to be no municipal wage graft in Springfield, and because the wages of the rock crusher force were reduced to the level paid elsewhere, or rather the hours were increased, the rock plant remained idle yesterday while the force was enjoying a strike. A new crew went to work this morning at the new wages. Monday night, at the council meeting, it was learned that the men on the quarry were paid \$2.50 but only worked nine hours because it was a city job. An ordinance was then passed placing the wages on the hour basis at 25 cents. The men who struck are unable to find better wages than that offered for the ten-hour schedule. Labor is plentiful now and the mills are turning off men every day. The wages seem to stay up higher than the demand would call for, but this may be caused by the higher wages paid on the railroad work above Natron where 2000 men are employed at prices that range from three dollars for common labor. The railroad gives rise to a large amount of the transient labor that supplies the local needs.

The city's experiment at building its own streets seems to be working out very well. The crushed rock is laid several blocks ahead of the roller. The new grader came yesterday and the sprinkler has been shipped. There are over 15 men working on the streets for the city now. The work will be continued until all the streets are graded and paved.

BERRIES BRING

OWNER GOOD PROFITS

Springfield, June 15.—Washburn & Clark have a four-acre berry patch on their experimental farm on the outskirts of the city that they think will yield them 50,000 pounds of berries this year. Those sold at the cannery price of three cents per pound and expenses of picking paid, they expect will yield them a good profit of over \$250 an acre. The land is away from the river and has no irrigation. The berries have been given but little care. There are other yards in this locality as heavily loaded as these.

Springfield Brevities

Springfield, June 15.—The Frazer foundry is nearly completed and needs only the installation of some of the heavy machinery to make it ready to be put in operation. This will be done in a couple of weeks, and a large force of men will be put on.

Barnes' dray team ran away one day last week and hit the telephone pole at the corner of Main and Second streets, leaving quite an impression on the stick. They tried to make the turn on Second street but failed and one horse went on each side of the pole. Both were thrown to the ground with force but neither was hurt.

Claud Washburne will do a delivery business with his father's White Steamer in Springfield this summer.

Many people are in the cherry orchards in this vicinity.

The body of Mrs. Evans Casebeer will be shipped from Cottage Grove tomorrow morning and the funeral will be held at the Camp Creek church tomorrow morning at 10:00 o'clock. Interment in the Camp Creek cemetery.

A representative of the Beals Machinery Company, of Portland, attended the council meeting Monday night and explained at length the method used in building the crushed rock streets. Mr. Patterson was very much pleased with the city and paid some very nice compliments. The council at this meeting placed an order with his people for five new dump wagons to be used on the streets to haul rock from the quarry and for general purposes.

Part of a carload of plumbing equipment has been received for the Gould Company, a new firm here.

The two pumps working on the third pier of the P. E. & E. bridge are trying to get the water low enough to work in. Bed rock is not very far below. They are down five feet now and Mr. Roney thinks he has reached it in the center but that it is further away at the ends. He had to take the men off the last pier because the water became so deep that they were unable to work. A pump will be taken off the third pier as soon as one can keep up with the water. The concrete mixing machine that was expected will not be used for it is just as cheap to mix by hand and cannot readily get the machine.

A crew of P. E. & E. surveyors went to work this morning at the end of the bridge, setting stakes for the line. They worked all day locating the curve on Mill street.

HOW FLYING MACHINE

GLIDE WAS DISCOVERED

Accident to Hamilton's Aeroplane Cause of the Discovery

In view of the new record set by C. Hamilton Monday in his flight from New York to Philadelphia and return, also the aviation meet to be held at the Lane county fair grounds on the 18th and 19th, yesterday's picture showing Whipple Hall, who is to fly here, and Hamilton in their former flight at Corvallis will be of interest. It was during this flight that the now famous glide was made for the first time, and its discovery was brought about by an accident which will show how prompt an aviator must think when an accident of this kind occurs.

The climatic conditions were just right for a record breaking flight when Hamilton started to ascend with Hall as a passenger. After circling the field twice at an elevation of 150 feet, they started south, gradually working up to an elevation of 1500 feet. After they had traveled south about eight miles they made a circle, starting back for the field. In the meantime the wind at 1500 feet had become quite strong, with the result that they dropped the machine to an elevation of 1000 feet. When just about to descend to the field, the propeller blade broke with a crash, the piece just flying over Hall's head, but luckily the aeroplane was traveling at such terrific speed that before it had settled 100 feet Hamilton had discovered that by dropping his elevation plane he could keep the machine going straight but at about 15 degrees angle. Then the strain became intense as it looked as though they would land amongst the autos parked at one end of the field, the unsuspecting having no opportunity to escape, but luckily they missed the machines by about 10 feet, landing just outside the fence.

This glide is what now makes it possible for long distance flights, eliminating the danger of falling unless a plane should break. Although when flying over a city it would be impossible to glide owing to the chimneys and buildings which would be in the way of a suitable landing place.

Mr. Hall has carefully gone over the surrounding country and has picked out a dozen suitable landing places within a radius of 50 miles, on which to land next Saturday and Sunday should it become necessary through accident.
