HAULING ROCK FOR SIUSLAW RIVER JETTY

One Scow Load Taken From the Quarry at Point Terrace Each Day

With flags flying and whistles blowing, the steamer Roberts passed Florence Wednesday morning, having in tow the first scow load of rock that has been delivered at the south jetty at the north of the Siuslaw river, says the Florence West.

Since operations commenced this spring buildings have been erected for a mess house and a bunk house, a receiving wharf constructed on which to transfer rock from the scows to the cars, and a tramway several hundred feet long built from the wharf down stream toward the bar. Besides this a large quantity of brush has been cut and tied up in bunches to be used in the jetty.

Up the river near Point Terrace a quarry has been opened at which to obtain rock for the jetty. Two engines set up and two derricks built for loading rock on the scows. Another load of rock will be taken down about today. For a short time they expect to handle about one scow load a day, but as soon as the work is well started about two loads of rock will be placed in the jetty each day.

It is the intention of the contractor to push the work forward rapidly during the summer and fall, as it can be carried on to better advantage during pleasant weather. — Florence West.

ACCIDENT IN FLORENCE SAWMILL

George Lockwood Caught by a Revolving Shaft — Other News

While working in the Oregon & California Lumber Co's mill in Florence Wednesday afternoon, Geo. Lockwood was caught by a revolving shaft and severely injured.

He was engaged in cleaning up the sawdust and rubbish that had collected under the live rollers near the band saw, when his sleeve caught on the shaft and quick as a flash his clothing was stripped off and he was thrown down on the floor under the machinery. Had the clothing not given away he would have been whirled around the shaft and probably killed.

Dr. Edwards was called and the injured man was taken home on a stretcher. The physician found numerous bruises on his side, neck and arms, and legs and three ribs broken. The wounds were dressed and he is getting along as well as could be expected.

SIUSLAW NOTES

The Willhelmina arrived again from Portland Wednesday with a good quantity of freight.

The steamer Roberts returned Sunday from Coquille with a new rock scow for the jetty work in tow. A deal was made a short time ago by which Mrs. Rich purchased Frank Sweet's house and lot in Acme. Mrs. Rich is the mother of Mrs. Southworth of Acme and Mrs. Mason of Point Terrace.

The Washburne arrived here Saturday from San Francisco and proceeded to take on a cargo from the Oregon and California Lumber Co's wharf. This is the first trip to the Siuslaw for this year. She went to sea again on Wednesday bound for San Francisco.
