FIELDER JONES MAY
PLAY BALL AGAIN

Chicago, June 17.—President Comiskey of the Chicago White Sox has given Fielder Jones, his former manager, now a resident of Portland, Or., where he is in the lumber business, permission to play the remainder of the season with the White Sox team of the Washington State league, a class D organization under the national agreement.

Although Comiskey evaded a direct answer, this move is taken as an indication that the famous manager who led the Sox to a world's championship and who never finished lower than third place, will supplant Duffy at the helm before the present season is over, perhaps. If not that, it is reasonably certain that Jones will manage the club next season. Reports from Oregon are to the effect that Jones has become quite heavy since leaving the game, but has worked off considerable flesh while coaching a college team in Oregon.
