## THE CONDITIONS IN CONGO ARE VERY BAD

### Report of Commission on Foreign Missions is Filed

Edinburgh, Scotland, June 20.—The Commission on Missions and Governments concluded its report, presented to the World's Missionary conference, today with an assertion that the claims of humanity and the rights of missions have been so flagrantly and continuously violated by the government of the Congo state (now taken over by Belgium), that an appeal for action should be made by the conference to all the powers which are signatories to the General Act of Berlin.

"We have no hesitation in asking the conference to make a decided pronouncement upon the Congo question," the report says. "The new state came into being under conditions which make the whole family of nations more directly responsible for its existence than is usually the case; they did not merely accept an accomplished fact, but lent an active hand to the accomplishment. This makes it doubly imperative that the conference should present a full weight of Christian sentiment, effectually voiced, to overcome the natural and usually commendable disposition of governments to meddle."

The commission heads the list of its findings with an expression of gratitude for the large amount of mutual helpfulness found to exist between so many missions and governments. Concerning the right of entry for Christian missions, the report says:

"Inasmuch as the results of missionary enterprises are now so evident and have extended over so long a period that their general beneficial effect is demonstrated, we think that it may reasonably be asked of all Christian governments that they should use their good offices with those of other nations for the free admission and exercise of missionary endeavor, where such admission is not now granted, and further, that such interposition may be justified to the governments, not on grounds of religion but upon the broad ground of humanity, on account of the beneficent influence of missions, and upon the common right of mankind to receive such benefits."

"While fully recognizing the duty and right of civil authorities of every country to lay such temporary restrictions and conditions upon the movements and settlements both of their own nationals and of foreigners within and across their borders, as are demanded in the interests of internal order and international peace, we think it well to record our judgment that it is not wise for the civil power to allocate areas of work to different missions, unless in conference with and with the concurrence of the missions concerned."

### COOS BAY AS

#### A HILL FACTOR

New York Paper Says He Must Build to Coast or Be a Harriman Feeder

According to the New York Herald, Hill will have to build a line to Coos Bay or his new lines in Southern and Central Oregon will be merely "feeders" for the Harriman system. This new view of the Coos Bay situation is of decided interest here as it presents another phase of the importance of this section in the railroad world. The statement is made in a page article appearing in the New York Sunday Herald, and the gist of it so far as Coos Bay is concerned, is as follows:

"It is assumed that when the Deschutes road connects with the Southern Pacific railway at Klamath Falls it will become a real through line between San Francisco and Portland, taking to the latter city the products of Southwestern Oregon that now go to the former city."

"The Deschutes railway as such will end at the head waters of the river at Odell. The Southern Pacific Railway, with a thousand men at work, is building through this point a one hundred and fifty mile extension of its Klamath Lakes line from Klamath Falls to Odell, whence it will swing around over the Cascade range, joining its main line again at Natron, in Western Oregon, by what is called the Natron cut-off."

"Odell seems to be destined to become a future railway center of great importance. In addition to having the Hill Oregon Trunk line and the Harriman Southern Pacific and Deschutes line, the Oregon Short line has obtained right-of-way to it across Southern Oregon from Ontario to Coos Bay, and will build to it by the time the rival roads get to it."

"Mr. Hill's idea of getting so far away from home by his rival line as Klamath Falls is yet to be explained by him. Klamath Falls is peculiarly invested by the Southern Pacific, but what will he do with those going south to San Francisco? Will he turn them over to his good friends, the Harriman lines? He has projected the Boise and Western Railroad, an east and west line across the center of Oregon from Boise, Idaho, to his Oregon Trunk line, via Burns, in the center of the state, to Coos Bay, tapping the richest section of the plateau. As matters now stand, it is asserted, all of his traffic not destined for Portland or the East by his Northern Pacific and Great Northern lines must be turned over to his rivals ultimately at Klamath Falls."
