EFFORTS TO BAR FIGHT IN NEVADA

San Francisco, June 20.—Purporting to come from Billy Deane, in Jack Johnson's camp, the latest sensation in the fight situation is the rumor that Governor Dickinson, of Nevada, will follow the example of Governor Gillette and prevent holding the fight either in Reno or Goldfield.

No confirmation of this could be secured, and sporting men here who know the Nevada law declare that a statute there was drawn expressly to prohibit the chief executive, the Attorney-General or District Attorneys, from interfering with a fight when promoters had paid their license fee of \$1000 and had secured a certificate showing that the fighters were in good physical condition and able to endure the exertions of the ring.

ST. HELEN'S HALL BUYS NEW SITE

To secure a new location for the private school for girls, trustees of acres six miles northwest of Portland on the hills south of Linnton and overlooking the Willamette and Columbia rivers, the city and the Tualatin valley. The land was bought from the Willalatin Investment Co. for \$10,000.

The property will be improved for a new school. The present property owned by St. Helen's academy will be placed on the market by the Episcopal diocese of Oregon and the funds from the sale will be applied toward the erection of a new set of school buildings. The present site is valued at \$200,000. It consists of 300x300 feet east of Ford street and between Park avenue and Main street.—Oregonian.

NEW SAWMILL NEAR COTTAGE GROVE

Cottage Grove, Or., June 18.—C. C. Shay, of Portland, has purchased a section of standing timber near Divide, two miles south of Cottage Grove, and will forthwith commence the erection of a sawmill of 50,000 daily capacity, to be completed and in operation within ninety days. The mill will cut railroad ties and timbers exclusively, and it is estimated by Mr. Shay that there is sufficient timber in the tract to run the mill for at least five years. Mr. Shay, who is the principal owner in three other corporations, will incorporate a company composed chiefly of Portland men, to operate the new timber deal. He left for the metropolis of Oregon this morning to complete arrangements.

CHAPMAN SUCCEEDS TOM RICHARDSON

C. C. Chapman, manager of the Chapman Advertising Bureau of Portland, was chosen the new publicity manager of the Portland Commercial Club. He will succeed Tom Richardson, whose resignation takes effect July 1. This action on the part of the executive committee of the club was the first work undertaken following the advent of the new chairman. The committee decided that the initial salary of the new publicity manager should be \$500 a month.
