CLARKE'S HOMER WINS GAME FOR LOCAL TEAM

Puts Ball Over the Centre Field
Fence in Ninth—Attendance Was Poor

Merely a handful of faithful fans saw Roberts Brothers' ball team win a fast game from the Montavilla Cubs of Portland yesterday, but those few were amply repaid for their little journey to Midway park. The game was fast and furious all the way and was won in the ninth inning after the Cubs had made it 1 to 1 in their half of the same canto. But Dudley Clarke, of University fame, landed squarely against one of Gravelle's twisters in Eugene's half and drove the little sphere over the center field fence, sending in Smith ahead of him.

No better game was ever played in this city, and it is about time for the fans here to wake up and go out to the games. There are 10,000 people in Eugene, and the paid admissions Sunday were only 131. When a team plays games where the scores are 1 to 0, 1 to 2 and 1 to 3, as the Roberts Brothers bunch has done in the last few weeks, the fans surely ought to give the boys a little better support. There ought to be 1,000 people at every game.

The first score of the game yesterday came in the fourth when Hobbs, the first man up, singled to left, went to second as Haworth overthrew first in an endeavor to catch him off the bag. Then Gravelle tossed wide to second and Hobbs loped to third from whence he scored when Clarke hit a long single to left. No more tallies were collected until the ninth, when, after two had been picked, Wright hit a slow one to second and Hobbs juggled the ball long enough for him to reach first. He purloined second on the first pitched ball and scored when Clarke let Haworth's grounder slip by him. Haworth stole second and third, but Garner struck out. With the score one all, Smith was hit with a pitched ball, and as he was perched on the first bag Clarke lifted the ball over the fence and the game was won.

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BIG ROW OVER ATHLETICS AT CORVALLIS

Director Angell Resigns Because O. A. C. Sport Is Not Clean

E. D. Angell, director of physical education at O. A. C. the past two years, has resigned and leaves tonight or tomorrow for Worcester, Mass., where he will be public supervisor of sixteen public playgrounds.

Mr. Angell's resignation is the result of the athletic committee's determination to have S. S. Metzger as coach of the football team next season. Director Angell preferred charges against Metzger for alleged violation of the rules governing collegiate athletics and of corrupting the morals of the team. The board listened, but only one, Prof. Peavy, stood with him, Cordley, Johnson and Pilkington declaring in favor of Metzger. "When the matter came up to Pres. Kerr, who has power to veto any committee decision, he passed the situation by, so Mr. Angell's resignation was handed in."

Angell Explains

Director Angell offers the following statement:

"In justice to myself and that my friends may not be wrongly advised, it is essential that I give my reasons for resigning as director of physical education at O. A. C. It was not a difference of opinion between last year's football coach and myself as has been suggested. It was a difference in ideals as to the purpose of collegiate athletics between the faculty committee on athletics, Pres. Kerr and myself. I opposed the reappointment of Mr. Metzger as football coach for the following reasons: He indicated a willingness to break the conference rules regarding the eligibility of players and even demanded that he be permitted to use men on the team that were clearly ineligible. I opposed him in this—the men were not used. Mr. Metzger misrepresented the facts of the case to the players and students to antagonize them against the director. "In opposition to my orders, he gave men liquor during the training season."

"At the close of the season he entertained a number of the boys at a drinking spree in the Oregon grill. Intoxication was one of the features. One of the boys intoxicated was later in the year expelled from the college for the same offense."

"The faculty committee approved the appointment of this man, with Prof. Peavy and myself voting against the appointment. Pres. Kerr did not choose to veto the committee's action, and feeling that I could not efficiently serve an institution whose athletics were to be built on low lines, I resigned. I cannot understand how members of the faculty, responsible for the influences that surround the young boys who come here, can expel the boy who gets drunk and endorse the coach who gives him the liquor."

"There is a greater thing than athletic victory and that is the knowledge that your sports are clean. A great institution such as ours should be above questionable motives. I deeply regret that conditions are such that I feel compelled to resign. I like the country and feel that a great work in my profession could have been done here. It grieves me to leave now the work that I had planned to do unfinished, but I feel that if I did not follow the dictates of my conscience in this matter I would lose something from my character that position or salary could not replace."

Metzger May Not Come
It is now rumored that Metzger will not come here; that he is signed up with Whitman or some other college, but this cannot be verified. In any event, this would make no difference in the Angell matter. The new position at Worcester, Mass., is a desirable summer job in a town of about 200,000. While there, Mr. Angell will also teach at the Howard summer school. The playground commission came to him as a result of his book, "Play," recently issued.

CHILD MILLER WILL

COACH O. A. C. TEAM

Corvallis, Or., June 25.—The board of control officially announced yesterday the selection of George Childmiller, of Dartmouth, as the coach of the O. A. C. football team for the approaching season. Mr. Childmiller was chosen from a long list of candidates because of his excellent past record. The members of the board felt that they have been most fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Childmiller, as he is considered one of the strongest men in the country under the changed rules. Mr. Childmiller has played football for seven years. He began his football career at Andover, playing four years on the team of that school. He entered Dartmouth and played three years on the strongest teams in the history of that old school. During this period Dartmouth defeated Harvard twice and played the third game a tie. After graduation Mr. Childmiller took command of the University of Maine football team and went through an arduous season with but two defeats against him.
