CORVALLIS BAR ENDORSES JUDGE J. W. HAMILTON

COLONIZES 400 ACRES

IN ROW RIVER VALLEY

Cottage Grove, Or., June 26.—Colonel John F. Spray has purchased 400 acres of bottom land in the Row river valley and is constructing an irrigating ditch a distance of three miles to water the tract, which will be set out to orchards and sold in five and ten acre tracts. It is his purpose to colonize the land with easterners, five of whom have already selected sites there. Not more than ten acres will be sold to any individual, and when they take up their residences in this fertile valley a schoolhouse and church will have been erected by the promoter.
