VARSITY WILL HAVE NO LACK OF PITCHERS NEXT BASEBALL SEASON

Several Good Men From the Prep Schools Coming Here

The loss of Henkle to the baseball team of the University will not be felt so much as some people fear, for although he was the only man that they had this year, there are expected a number of freshmen next season that will prove able substitutes for the southpaw who gave Oregon her place in the league this year. Houck, of Washington High, made a wonderful record as a right handed twirler in inter-scholastic baseball and is being watched by all the baseball crowd. He is by all means the best pitcher that inter-scholastic baseball has seen in this state, and with a little training in 'varsity company he will prove very valuable. He intends to enter the University next fall. Another star twirler that rivalled Houck this year was Cobb, on the Portland academy team. He is an unusual twirler and has an assortment that can be developed to a formidable array.

Rankin, the pitcher that came from the unknown regions of Pleas-

ant Hill this year and took back with his bunch of country husky lads the scalps of the Oregon second team, graduated from the Pleasant Hill high school this year and will enter the 'varsity next fall and probably rush his city rivals for a place in the box. He has some curves that are baffling and he can be developed more.

Besides these new men there are the old men that were made second rate this year by Henkle's brilliancy or their own mishaps. Tommy Word, who was just getting himself into pitching shape so that Tom Kelly was beginning to feel proud of him, hurt his arm and had to retire. He will again be in shape when the season opens next year. Rhinehart, who had as fancy a bunch of curves as any of the other men, but who couldn't stay on the ground, should have after a year's practice obtained some control of himself and win the laurels that might have been his this year. Besides all these there is Jamison, who made his appearance in the box late this season and showed his baseball friends where he should have been all the time, will probably be given a chance to do the work that he did at the last few games this season to relieve Henkle's loneliness, and who did so well on fast balls. And then with all these there are several freshmen this year who tried for the place this season, and although they were not far enough along to handle the important place, should be far along in the running by next spring. Warren Cozons is one of these.

CLARKE WILL NOT PLAY PROFESSIONAL BASEBALL AT ALL

Dudley Clarke, Oregon's hard-hitting star on the baseball field, and who has received so many flattering offers from professional baseball this year, has given up all hopes of entering the professional game. Finally turned it down when he replied to a fancy offer from Walter McCredie, of Portland, a day or so ago that he would not accept his offer at any time. Clarke had a report in the papers that he had signed with Tacoma, but this was premature and the Washington newspapers had taken for fact what Blankenship had desired most but was unable to secure. The last offer he received was from McCredie over a week ago, but he entirely neglected to answer it until day before yesterday. Clarke will attend the University summer school this summer and make up the work that the time he devoted to the interest of Oregon's name in inter-collegiate sport. This will give him his diploma and he will take post graduate work at Harvard next fall. There is no more baseball, or at least no professional ball, for the greatest all-around player and hard hitter that Oregon ever had.

ANOTHER STORY OF HENKLE'S APPEARANCE

Here is another story of the first appearance of Henkle, the University of Oregon pitcher. It appeared in the Spokane Herald and was sent as a dispatch from Seattle by Ed R. Hughes, sporting editor of the Seattle Times:

In the hope of breaking the losing streak, Seattle tried out a "rah-rah" pitcher today, but the result was the same old story. Seattle lost the sixth straight game. The new pitcher's name is Ferdinand Henkle. He hails from the University of Oregon, and he is a comely youth, but this company is entirely too rough for him. The peace and quiet of that dear old Eugene suits him far better than facing a lot of Indians from Spokane, who dent his delivery every time they come within reaching distance of the ball.

Spokane started with Dan Ryan, but one run and a place was sufficient for him. During that time Seattle scored its one run on hits by Alken and Seaton. Then Jack Killley took up the job and blanked last year's champions the rest of the route.

Ferdinand escaped with four runs and ten hits chalked against him. He had a horse shoe or the total would have been 20 hits and 15 runs. Seattle has sent better pitchers than Ferdinand to the Twilight League.

Nordyke and Cartwright and Cooney got fat on the offerings of the "rah-rah" pitcher.

Spokane was in trouble only once. Seattle got the bases loaded in the seventh with only one down and Jimmy Adams was sent in to hit for Hemenway. He forced a runner at the plate and, as Henkle was an easy out, the hope of a rally was quickly blighted.
