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THE "ASSEMBLY" OR THE DIRECT PRIMARY

State Senator Bingham has announced his candidacy for reelection, and will go directly before the voters of the county in the Republican primaries regardless of any action the "assembly" may take. Senator Bingham, it is generally admitted, has made one of the most energetic representatives Lane county has ever had in the legislature, not only looking after local matters, but has had a large share in the framing of important state legislation, and this fact makes him a strong candidate to succeed himself. We believe, furthermore, that in going directly to the people, thus fully recognizing the spirit, as well as the letter, of the primary law, Senator Bingham has made a move that a large majority of the Republican voters will approve.

We cannot see how the "assembly," so-called, differs from the old-time convention if it is generally accepted and all precincts by caucus elect delegates to the county meeting. It will be nothing more or less than a delegate convention placing a ticket in the field, just as was done in the days before the primary law was enacted, and if the tickets so nominated throughout the state are endorsed by the voters, it means that the old plan will have been restored, no matter whether the primary law is actually repealed, or is allowed to encumber the statute books as a dead letter measure.

On the other hand, if the "assembly" is not generally recognized by the party voters, and many precincts in the county are not represented, the ticket named will go before the party in the

primaries as the choice merely of a faction, who will be accused of attempted dictation in party affairs, and its candidates will be weakened by the endorsement and to a certain extent discredited by the rank and file of the party, who have taken no hand in their selection.

We believe the voters of all parties are strong in the opinion that the direct primary law should be given a full and fair trial—that the people are not yet ready to surrender the right they have acquired to name their own candidates for office. They know that in many states the direct primary has been successful, that it has not destroyed party organization but has rather purified it of bossism, and this knowledge is backed by the belief of the plain people of Oregon that they are fully capable of self-government and quite intelligent enough to express their wishes at the polls without first having a delegate convention controlled by political mechanism, to select for them men who are entitled to their suffrages.

Senator Bingham and others who favor the direct primary law may be politicians just the same as those who advocate the "assembly" plan, but they are especially to be commended in that they are willing to go before all the voters of their party and accept their wishes as to candidacy for office. Politics will be a more useful vocation and the holding of office imply greater honor when those who are selected for public positions are chosen by the people and not through the manipulation of conventions, made up of delegates chosen by precinct caucuses in which few of the voters have actually participated.

A state convention of Esperantists has been called for July 16 in the convention hall of the Portland Commercial Club, when students of the new world language, educators, teachers and others interested are asked to meet to consider the organization of a state Esperanto association. Other matters vital to the widespread adoption of the new language will come up. Among these will be the election of delegates to the International Esperanto Congress, to be held at Washington, D. C., August 14-20, and the proposal to introduce Esperanto in the public schools, as it is being done in Maryland and elsewhere. Further information about the coming convention can be had from the Portland Commercial Club.

The railroad assessment in Lane county should be looked after, because if it should be placed below \$40,000 per mile the individual taxpayer will be compelled to pay more than a just proportion of the taxes. Property values have been raised materially this year to bring the assessment as nearly up to actual value as possible, and the railroad assessment should be raised in accordance with the new scale.
