## SPRINGFIELD

### PUBLICITY FUND WILL BE SPENT

Springfield, July 1.—The commercial club will meet tonight for the first time in several weeks and there are on hand several important matters for consideration. It is planned to appoint a publicity committee which is to lay plans to spend the money that was raised the first of this year for that purpose. There is some \$2,000 subscribed that has remained idle for the last two months and will now be used to advertise the city. The method in which it will be used will be decided upon by the committee that will be named tonight.

Another matter that will come up is the plan to hold a big celebration of some kind here this fall. Very few plans have been laid for this yet, but it will be fully discussed at the club meeting. It is planned to hold some sort of affair that will bring the farmers into the city and that will make the city known in the papers of the state.

### FARMERS WHO HELD SPUDS WILL LOSE

Springfield, July 1.—With new potatoes coming to the market, a number of the farmers have found themselves with a great deal of last year's crop in their hands that will prove a total loss. It is said that some of the farmers have as many as 1200 bushels each of the old potatoes on their hands that cannot be sold at any price and which they held out of the market the past winter when offered a good price, thinking that it would raise. There were also a large number of potatoes left in the ground over winter that could not be dug when they were wanted and now are of no value. Early "spuds" have been on the market now for nearly a month and bring about a cent and a half a pound at the stores.

### FRED GOULD ASSAULTS MAN AT ALBANY

Albany, Or., June 30.—Considering that he failed to get justice at the hands of the grand jury, Fred Gould, of the Gould Livery Stables, took the law into his own hands and administered a severe beating to one Anton Mielnicki, a Bohemian, who had been arrested and charged with stealing a horse from Gould's stables. The grand jury investigated the case and found that the defendant did not sell the horse in question, so had not violated the law, and so returned a true bill. Enraged over the matter, Gould hunted up the discharged defendant, and in the scuffle the Bohemian suffered a black eye and a badly scarred face.

Fearing further harm Mielnicki fled to the county jail and took refuge in a cell. It is expected that Gould will be prosecuted.

Gould formerly lived in Eugene, and was engaged in the concrete contracting business with G. F. Pyle.

William Brice Cumberland, a druggist of St. Louis, has entered the race for the democratic nomination for United States senator from Missouri to succeed Senator Warner.

Ashland has voted \$55,000 bonds for improvement at a special election \$25,000 of this sum being for an electric plant and \$30,000 for paving street crossings.

The Clark-Henry Construction Co., of Sacramento, Calif., was Tuesday awarded the contract for laying ten blocks of asphalt pavement at Roseburg. Later the company will probably be given a contract for 10 blocks more. It is to begin work in 20 days and complete it in 120 days. The bill was \$1.62 a square yard.

Actual work has begun on the depot park at Albany with a couple of men in the field, and the stakes set for leveling the large tract of ground which, when done, will make the place present a new appearance. The Women's Club has about one thousand dollars on hand. The estimated cost of the entire project is \$3,000.

In the Douglas county clerk's semi-annual statement, just published, it is shown that Douglas county is not only out of debt but that the resources exceed the liabilities by the substantial sum of \$13,329.03. This is the first time in more than 20 years that the financial affairs of the county have been in such good condition. Only a few years ago the county was in debt more than \$100,000. The county judge and commissioners say that from now on good road building will be a feature of the future work.
