GRISWOLD AGAINST
ASSEMBLY
PLAN

Candidate for County Clerk on
Republican Ticket Gives
Out An Interview

Charles N. Griswold, Republican
candidate for the nomination of county
clerk, gave out an interview today
in regard to the assembly plan, as fol-
lows:

Q. What is your position in re-
gard to the assembly?

A. In my official announcement I
stated plainly my position in regard
to the so-called "assembly." I am
not in favor of the assembly, for it is
contrary to the direct primary nomi-
nation law. I intend to go before
the people according to the provi-
sions of that law, as is shown by the
fact of my having filed my intention
to be a candidate before the conven-
tion is held.

Q. Are you seeking the endorse-
ment of the assembly and would you
sanction the action should they en-
dorse you?

A. No; I am not seeking the en-
dorsement of the assembly, but
should they endorse me I do not see
any reason why I should not accept
it just the same as the endorsement
of an yother voter. I thought that
the assembly was hunting men, seek-

ing to find the worthy and well qual-
ified, and having found the most cap-
able men for office to recommend
them to the voters of the county or
state. If this is so it is for it to hunt
me and not for me to seek it.

Question Up to the People
I believe that the people of the
county or state should have the right
given by the primary law to select
their own officers. Therefore I am
going direct to the people with my
candidate, and am pledging them
that if I am nominated and elected I
will conduct the office in a business-
like manner, for their best interests,
fairly and economically. But beyond
this pledge to the people I am mak-
ing no pledges and no promises, and
do not intend to enter into any en-
tangling alliances or to bind myself
to obey the dictates of any man or set
of men.
