BIG GRASS FIRE ON SKINNER'S BUTTE CAUSES ALARM

Small Boy With Fire Crackers Responsible for Blaze This Morning

An alarm of fire was sounded this morning at 9:05 o'clock on account of a grass blaze on the south slope of the butte. The fire wagon made a run out West Eighth street, thence north on Lawrence to the railroad and past, and seeing that their services would be of no avail, the firemen returned to their quarters.

The fire started near Lincoln street and rapidly spread. Before it was extinguished it had covered a space perhaps a block and a half long by three-fourths of a block wide. It should have been allowed to spread further to kill some of the poison oak vines.

V. Bobovsky, who lives on Lawrence street, a block from the foot of the butte, says the fire started from a firecracker. He saw a boy firing crackers there and soon afterwards the blaze was seen. After it had spread quite a distance, Mr. Bobovsky took a big bucket of water in which was soaked a number of sacks brought by Amos Wilkins, who lives at the corner of West Fifth and Lawrence streets, and with the assistance of quite a number of boys succeeded in beating the flames out with the wet sacks.

PORTLAND-EUGENE ROAD FAIRLY GOOD

A. Welch, 560 East Taylor street, journeyed with his family in an automobile to Eugene last Tuesday and returned the following day. Going by way of Oregon City, Independence, Salem and Corvallis, he covered this distance of 232 miles as recorded by the speedometer in about five hours running time.

The start was made at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, an hour was taken out at Salem and another at Albany, and Eugene was reached at 5 p. m. The return trip was completed between 9:30 a. m. Tuesday and 1 p. m. Wednesday. The machine used was a seven-passenger Pope-Hartford.

Welch reported on his return that the roads were good except a 15-mile stretch between Salem and Woodburn. Here there were three or four inches of dust, due to the fact that no gravel is spread on the road. South of Salem the roads were found to be unusually good.—Oregonian.

UNCLE SAM'S RECEIPTS SHOW GOOD SURPLUS

Washington, July 5.—A surprising surplus of \$9,402,432 in the year's ordinary receipts and expenditures instead of the expected deficit; a decrease of \$1,648,337 for the month in the public debt; \$17,462,815 received from the corporation tax and an \$11,000,000 cut in postal deficiency disbursements for the year are some of the remarkable features of yesterday's Treasury Department reports for the fiscal year ended June 30.

The surplus in normal operations, the most gratifying feature of all to the Treasury officials, was against a deficit of the same items last year of \$58,734,953, while the total deficit formed by adding the big Panama canal transactions, expenditures for which the Treasury eventually will be reimbursed, and the public debt statistics, reached only \$25,884,644 today, against a deficit over all of \$118,795,920 a year ago.

The returns from the corporation tax helped to increase the working balance in the banks.

SAME FOURTH IDEA CUTS DEATH TOLL

Independence Day Fatalities Reach a Total of Nine—45 Last Year

Chicago, July 4.—Victory in large capitals for the advocates of a quiet and sane Independence day is the message that comes from hundreds of cities today. Early returns indicate there is a big falling off in the death list as compared with the mortality harvest of other years, and that there is a proportionate decrease in the number of maimed.

In the two days preliminary to the actual celebration last year 30 deaths were reported. In the like time this year, only five deaths are scheduled. At the end of the day of celebration last year, July 5—the death list included 45 victims. The first series of reports tonight makes the number of fatalities nine.

Three Killed in Pittsburgh. Pittsburgh furnishes three of the deaths, all from firearms. At midnight only one fatality is reported from Chicago.

Providence, R. I., had the quietest Fourth in its history, due to the strict enforcement of rigid ordinances against dangerous explosives or deadly firearms.

ONE SHEPHERDER KILLS ANOTHER

Burns, Or., July 4.—In a shooting affray, a shepherd known as Jimmie Leonard, was killed by another Dick Williams, on Steen's mountain, south of Diamond, 75 miles from Burns, early Monday morning.

Leonard had lived in this country several years and was reputed a quarrelsome, dangerous man, who went armed and proclaimed his readiness to use his weapons. He was quite an old man, and is said to have accumulated considerable money and property.

After the killing Williams came to Diamond and telephoned to the sheriff, who went there in his auto, placed Williams under arrest and brought him to Burns, but did not put him in jail, as the facts seemed to make it a case of justifiable homicide.
