For some time it has been noised about that automobile tires would advance 20 per cent on July 1st. True to their word, most of the manufacturers of automobile tires have made this advance.

An interesting condition has been developed, however, by the Michelin Company, in whose four factories is manufactured fully 45 per cent of all the tires used in the world, announcing that its prices will remain the same until there is more good cause for higher prices than at the present time.

It is true the average price of crude rubber gum has for a short time been somewhat higher than usual but from information that has been secured from the inspection of rubber growing territories by several good authorities, it is evident this higher price is not due to diminishing supply. On the contrary, the supply of gum during the past few months has shown a decided increase. The real cause seems to be that the demand incident to the enormous output of automobiles has been so great as to make even the increased supply inadequate. There is plenty of rubber gum in Brazil to last for years at the present rate of consumption, and with the constantly increasing facilities for gathering it there is according to good authority, little cause to work about shortage in supply.

MAROONS LOSE THIRD GAME TO ROBERTS BROS.

The Portland Maroons lost the third and last game of the series with the Roberts Bros. yesterday afternoon at the fair grounds before the race began. The score was 11 to 6, making a total of 37 runs for Roberts Bros. in the three games to 9 for the Maroons. The Portland Reds were simply outclassed at every department of the game, although they held the local team down to a small score in the first year.

CAPTAIN EVENDEN'S SIDE OF DIFFICULTY

Following is a letter from J. C. Evenden, captain of the 1909 O. A. C. football team, giving his side of the Angell trouble at the college:

"In regard to the matter of the controversy between Professor Angell and Coach Metzger, I think I may be able possibly to explain a few of the statements or charges Angell has made.

"Angell charges Metzger with wanting to play men who were ineligible under the conference rules. This statement is not true, but trouble arose over the matter. For Metzger was allowed to go ahead and make out two men for the positions on the team, only to have them taken away the night before we left for Walla Walla.

"No liquor was used on the team during the training season, of that I am sure, with the exception of one man who had a glass of ale every night for three nights before the Oregon game. And even this was not by Metzger's orders, but by a doctor's orders who was supposed to have charge of the team.

"The charge of Angell, in which he says that a number of the team got drunk in the Oregon game, is not only false, but is a plain lie. It is true that Metzger, six or seven of the team, myself included, and some other gentlemen, went into the grill after the theatre, more for a place to sit down and talk and listen to the orchestra than anything else. It is true that wine was drunk. I was with the party from the time it started until it broke up, and no member of the team or any other student had more than two small glasses of a very mild wine. I was up all night with Reck, who had one of the bones of his leg broken, and I saw every man come into the hotel, and every man of the O. A. C. team was under the influence of liquor.

"Coach Metzger was a man who was respected by every man on the team and by the entire student body. The idea that Metzger was not fit morally to coach the O. A. C. team seems a joke to me. No swearing was allowed on the field, or at training quarters. No gambling nor betting was allowed, and not a man of the squad broke training rules during the season.

"Personally I have nothing against Angell, and I think he will admit I was his best friend while at college, but I do not see where he can gain by trying to knock Metzger's name, for if O. A. C. did not have a gentleman for a coach, an honest man for a coach, and one of the best coaches in the United States last year she never will have.

MANY ARGUMENTS FILED AT SALEM

Salem, Or., July 2.—More affirmative arguments rolled into the office of the secretary of state today. Chief Clerk H. H. Cooley stated he would remain on duty all day the fourth of July for the purpose of receiving these arguments. The time for filing them expires at 5 o'clock next Monday night and the chief clerk will forego his holiday for that reason.

Charles True Wilson filed affirmative arguments of considerable length for the proposed constitutional amendment and bill to make the state dry. The Oregon State Federation of Labor filed an argument in favor of the employers' liability act, and J. B. A. Butler and Ira Powell, of Monmouth, appeared with an argument in favor of the normal school at that place.

Arguments favoring Nesmith county and the annexation of a portion of Clackamas county to Multnomah county were also filed.
