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STATE BOARD OF HEALTH ACTIVE

According to reports sent out from Portland the Oregon State Board of Health, at its quarterly meeting, took decided steps toward safe-guarding the public health. A campaign of education along the lines of protecting the people of the state from common errors was determined upon, and the propaganda will be spread in the state newspapers, by special bulletins, and by lectures, as well as by every practicing physician.

Farmers are to be enlightened on methods of preventing the communication of disease from infected animals. A health car will be attached to farming demonstration trains sent into the rural districts. Among the campaigns planned to be taken up at once is the warfare against the house fly. Tuberculosis and typhoid fever will also be made the objects of attack by means of popular education on these subjects.

Small plans of sanitary bungalows will be prepared for the use of people with weak lungs to demonstrate how they may guard against attacks of lung disease. The use of paper drinking cups in schools throughout the state, and many other reforms are planned.

The more careful handling of animals and the lessening of dangers arising from slack methods of slaughtering them will be objects of the state board. Impure wells near slaughter houses, the water from which is used for washing the meat, are charged

by the board with causing much disease, and these places will be forced to improve conditions at once.

Schools throughout the state will receive the attention of the board when they open in the fall. Unsanitary conditions will be corrected as soon as possible, and a rigid inspection system is planned. Paper napkins are recommended by the board for use in public places instead of the cloth article. The destruction of napkins after their use is believed to be in the interest of more healthful conditions.

NO RACE SUICIDE IN RUSSIA

An examination of the figures given out by the Russian government statistical department, based on data gathered last year, shows a remarkable increase in population during the last twelve years and proves that Russia is in no danger from race suicide. The population of the empire is now 160,095,200, an increase of 33,199,000, or 26.2 per cent since the last general census in 1897.

The proportion according to races is as follows: Russian, 65.5 per cent; Tartars, 10.6 per cent; Polish, 6.2 per cent; Finnish, 4.5 per cent; Jewish, 3.9 per cent; Lithuanian and Lettish, 2.4 per cent; German, 1.6 per cent; other nationalities, 5.3 per cent.

Of the entire population 86.5 per cent is engaged in agricultural pursuits, the urban population numbering only 13.5 per cent.

Figures on the proportion of the sexes show an excess of females only in European Russia and Finland, males predominating in Poland, the Caucasus and Siberia.

The republic of France, on the other hand, presents a problem in depopulation which the legislators are attempting to solve. Measures recently introduced in parliament, designed to enforce marriage among state employees, and to stimulate the birth rate, will come up for action this week. It is practically certain that the vote will be favorable, as French legislators and statesmen "view with alarm" the steadily decreasing number of visits of the stork to French households.

The proposed measures include the imposition of additional military duty upon bachelors more than twenty-nine years old, making obligatory the marriage of state employees who have reached the age of twenty-five years, with supplementary salaries and pension allowances for those with more than three children, and the repeal of the law requiring the equal distribution of the estates among the children.

The dislike of Frenchmen to divide their property is a frequent cause of restricted families, according to those who have made a study of the subject.

The proposed legislation follows the recent publication of vital statistics, which showed that the births in the Republic during 1909 were 77,000 against 79,000 in the preceding year, and that the population has been increased by only 3,000,000 since 1851.

Good streets, pretty lawns and clean premises are the best advertisement of any town. The people of Eugene can do much

toward making the place inviting to strangers by looking after the appearance of their premises.

There ought to be special attention given the city park blocks where the celebration took place. The trampling of the crowds put them in bad shape, but they should not be allowed to remain in that condition.
