HAY HARVEST AT ITS HEIGHT; CROP MUCH HEAVIER THIS YEAR

Price Is Well Up Now, But As Crop Comes in It Will Probably Weaken

All over the country the farmers are hard at work on their hay crop, which promises to be one of the largest that has been cut for a good while. Not only is the crop heavier to the acre but it weighs more to the load. While sometimes it goes less than a ton to the average load, this year, however, a load will tip the scales at over a ton and a half. The large quantity of good hay that will be on the market in a few days, however, will bring the price away down this year and it is not expected to go over \$10 or \$11 a ton, and may fall as low as \$8. The hay is cutting heavily and the average acre will yield a ton and a half. This hot weather is a good thing for curing the hay and has come at the right time. In a few days the streets will be full of the high loads of hay and the dusty covered roads will be well lined with the whips of the horse feed that catch and cling to the brush along the way.

Because of the good market now there will be a large amount of hay baled, and several farmers have bought hay balers and will go from farm to farm in thresher fashion and bid the hay so that it can be stored until next winter. This year a marked feature of the haying is the amount of machinery that it uses, eliminating the hand work.

New York, July 7.—The gold importation movement of 1910 had its inception today with the engagement of \$1,750,000 in gold bars in London by Lazard Freres for importation to the United States.
