MANY AUTOISTS MAKE CENTRAL OREGON TRIP

Round Trip Portland Up Deschutes and Back by Willamette Valley

An automobile trip that is becoming more and more popular with the Portland and Washington tourists, who desire more of an extended tour than a hundred miles or so, is the trip through Central Oregon from the northern to the southern boundaries of the state, going up the Deschutes valley, passing Crater lake and through the Klamath country and returning by way of Medford and the Willamette valley. This makes a tour of 800 to 1000 miles, and the road is such that it can be covered without the aid of an expert driver. The scenery along this route is said to be wonderful and the number of places of note that are taken in on this one trip are numerous. Passing to the head of this river and crossing the divide into the lake country one reaches the most beautiful part of the journey. Besides the famous Crater lake there are a half a hundred other lakes of more or less renown that can be stopped at. At Klamath Falls can be seen the Southern Pacific's operations where the company is building its cutoff through to Eugene and the long trestle across the big lake. Going from there to Medford and from this southern Oregon city to Eugene, the autoists can see practically all the places of interest in Oregon that are so often heard of.

On this one trip can be seen nearly the whole state and the way leads through mountain, desert and farming scenery. And then there are numerous side trips, such as at the start to Baker City and eastern Oregon

points and in the south across into Nevada or to California, and on the return to Coos Bay, and from there it is possible to return along the coast as far as the Siuslaw. And last of all, the greatest of all is the great McKenzie river trip.

A great many returned cars have made this trip and many others are planning it. After "Pathfinder" Beck, of the Portland Automobile Association, returns and publishes the complete maps of the trip, still more will make it. Yesterday a party of Portland men in a large Pope-Hartford stopped over in Eugene at the start of the trip. The party is composed of E. E. Covert, a prominent Portland attorney; A. S. Benson, a capitalist of that city; J. B. Yeon, also a retired capitalist, and Tom Ferris, a commission man. They are starting through western Oregon first and will make the trip to Coos Bay and Crater lake before returning. They will spend two or three weeks in their bachelor outing.

That the automobile tour no longer requires an expert is shown by the remarkable trip made by a Winton owned and driven by Col. S. C. Spencer, who arrived in Eugene Saturday and left yesterday for Portland, after he, accompanied by his wife and Dr. B. E. Wright, a Portland dentist, and his wife, had completed the long trip over the state. Col. Spencer has only had his car a few months, and neither had had any previous experience at driving. It was his first trip out of Portland and was, they can report, an exceedingly successful experience, having made the whole trip without a puncture or delay of any sort. They went from Portland to Hood River, from there to The Dalles, continuing through Shaniko and Bend they went up the Deschutes and to Fort Klamath. From there they went to Crater lake, where they spent a couple of days, and returned the customary way through Medford, Grants Pass and Roseburg. They started July 4 and have made remarkably good time.

COTTAGE GROVE

AWARDS CONTRACT FOR STREET PAVING

Cottage Grove, Or., July 17.—The city council at an adjourned meeting of a regular session last night opened bids for the paving of Main street from the railroad track west to the Coast Fork of the Willamette river, through the business portion of town, and of East Fourth street from the Christian church to the Southern Pacific railroad track.

As the advertisement for bids invited only contractors for bituminous pavement, there was only one bidder, the Warren Construction company which was \$2.35 per square yard with excavating, filling and curbing extra. After some debate, the council unanimously awarded the Main street contract to the Warren Construction company at the bidding price, and laid the Fourth street matter on the table. Work on Main street will be started soon by the contractors, who will purchase their crushed rock from the city at \$1.50 per square yard and pay the city \$5 per day for the use of the steam roller purchased by the city some time ago.

Mayor Kime was instructed to appoint a committee of two from the council to confer with City Attorney Counters, and prepare plans for the revision of the city charter. After their report, a special election will be called for this purpose, as the city charter in its present form is inadequate to the growing needs of the city.

VESUVIUS MINE TO RESUME OPERATIONS

Cottage Grove, Or., July 18.—The Vesuvius mine in the Bohemia district resumed work this week, after having been idle for nearly a year, and the large 30-stamp mill will be in operation within another week. F. J. Hard, the superintendent, has just returned from the east, whether he went for consultation with the shareholders, and give out the information that the mine will be worked continuously. A crew of miners went into camp on Wednesday.

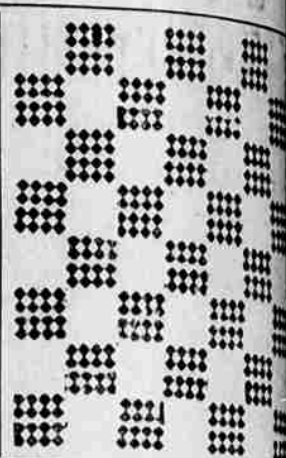

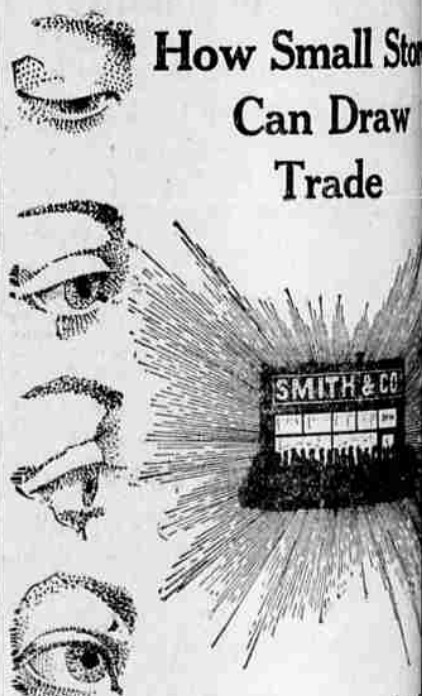
