EUGENE HORSES NOW AT SALEM

Salem, July 21.—The latest arrival among the horsemen at the state fair grounds is J. R. Springer, from Los Angeles, of Sonoma Girl (2:05 1/4) fame. Mr. Springer, recognizing the fine track and accommodations, came here to get his horses ready for the season's races on the North Pacific circuit. He brought with him Lady Sirius, 2:10 1/4; Mountain Boy, who has trotted a mile since his arrival in 2:17; a 3-year-old filly by Lady Garland, and also another filly by Mon Belles, who is working out in 2:25.

Other recent arrivals at the track are Robbins & Son, who have moved their string of nine fine head here from Eugene. The colony of horse-owners and trainers at the Lone Oak track is rapidly becoming the proportions of a small-sized town, and the animals working out are some of the finest on the Pacific coast. Some classy brushes occur almost every day between the thoroughbreds.

SAYS LANGFORD WILL WHIP JOHNSON

"If Sam Langford can ever drag Jack Johnson into the ring," says Billy Gimson, the New York sporting

man, "for a boxing match, he will whip the champion in big time—less than five rounds. Johnson whipped practically a dead man in Jeffries, and nobody knows this better than Johnson. He knew that Jeff was merely a shell and as hollow as a drum. If he had not known so an elephant could not have dragged Johnson into the ring with Jeffries."

RAILROADS KILL MANY THOUSANDS DURING PAST YEAR

Washington July 21.—Railroads of the United States killed 8722 persons and injured 95,626 during the year ending July 30, 1910, according to a synopsis of the annual report of the interstate commerce commission just given out.

The report shows that 253 passengers were killed and 10,009 injured; 1244 trainmen met death and 29,000 were injured. The number of trespassers killed was 4844. One passenger was killed to every 3,500,000 carried.

The total number of passengers carried was 281,909,000. The par value of outstanding railroad stock is given at \$17,500,000.

COTTAGE GROVE MAYOR FAVORS SUNDAY SHOWS

Cottage Grove, Or., July 21.—Mayor A. W. Kine has gone on record as favoring Sunday picture shows, providing the entertainment is of a moral character. The question came up during a regular session of the city council. Mayor Kine declared one man had as much right as another to run a picture show on Sunday, and inasmuch as the churches had exhibited pictures on these days, he could see no reason why others should not be permitted to do likewise.

The mayor's position has created a stir in local religious circles, where the opposition to the Sunday theater originated about a year ago. At that time a petition asking the council to close the picture shows on the night of the seventh day was circulated among business men and others, and was largely signed. The picture shows were ordered closed and the license fee reduced accordingly. There is a movement under way to urge upon the aldermanic body the need of keeping the playhouses dark on Sundays.

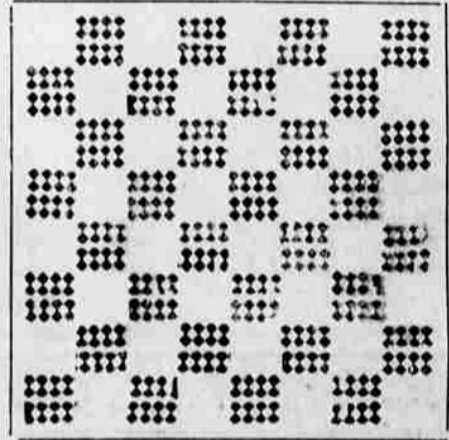
