### BOUNDARY DECISION WILL START WORK

Springfield, July 21.—The municipal improvements and street macadamizing that have been held up for lack of funds because of the uncertainty of the city's credit will be resumed during the next few days, since the city limits have been defined and the election pronounced legal by Judge Harris. Not only because the money has been held up pending the certainty of the city boundary extension, but work has been halted to only the parts of town where there was no question as to whether the paving was done in the city or the country. Money men have hesitated to take up the city warrants pending this decision, and the city authorities have been in a rather embarrassing position to work without money. Now that the city's credit has been restored, work will commence at once. The street macadamizing will be rushed to completion before the wet weather begins. Nearly every block of street in the city will be repaired if it needs it. The quarry and rock crusher will be started in a few days and a large number of men will be employed.

There have been no new contracts offered for the rock work, and it is probable that the city will do it itself without a contract.

The council meeting that was intended for Tuesday evening and also one planned for yesterday were not held because there was nothing ready to work with.

Now that the city corporate limits are definitely located it will be possible for the bonds to carry at the coming election, and the street work can be done under the provisions of the Bancroft act.

### FIRE ALARM THIS AFTERNOON

Springfield, July 21.—The fire department was called out this afternoon to extinguish a small fire in the sawdust on Mill street near the railroad bridge, which had not been seen in time would have endangered the wooden approach.
