State Treasurer—Ralph W. Hoyt, Portland.

Superintendent of Public Instruction—L. R. Alderman, Eugene.
State Printer—William J. Clarke, Gervais.

Attorney-General—J. N. Hart, Baker City.

Officers for which candidates will be recommended today:

Four justices supreme court, labor commissioner, state engineer, State railroad commissioner (at large).

The Platform.
The republicans of Oregon, in assembly convened, reaffirm their faith in the principles of the republican party, and with pardonable pride point to the record of its achievements.

We affirm our faith in the principles of representative government and in the maintenance of political parties, believing that no party can maintain its identity or exert its influence for good government without organization.

As the representatives of the republican voters of Oregon we find our warrant for this assembly in the express provisions of the preamble of the direct primary law, which reads as follows:

"Political parties are useful and necessary. The method of naming candidates for elective officers by political parties and voluntary political organizations is the best plan yet found for placing before the people the names of qualified and worthy citizens from whom the electors may choose the officers of our government."

"Every political party and every voluntary political organization has the same right to be protected from the interference of persons who are not identified with it as its best known and publicly avowed members, that the government of the state has to protect itself from the interference of persons who are not known and registered as electors."

We commend as the sentiment of this assembly the words of Governor Charles E. Hughes:

"I believe in party organization and I desire to see it strong, efficient and representative."

And the expression of Theodore Roosevelt that:

"Voters should be guaranteed the right to determine within the ranks of their respective organizations who the candidates of the parties shall be."

We reaffirm our faith in the principles of representative government and the maintenance of political parties, believing that no party or association of men can maintain its identity or exert its influence for the principles it expresses without organization; we believe in the wisdom of counsel, and as free citizens of a free government we enjoy the constitutional right as members of the republican party to assemble for the purpose of adopting a platform, considering the fitness of candidates, making recommendations to the people and performing such other duties as may be deemed wise and expedient; and that any infringement upon such right is a denial of the wisdom of the founders of our government, both state and national, and against the rights guaranteed by our constitution and a violation of the real spirit of the direct primary law, with the fundamental principles of which we are in hearty accord, and believe it should be supported and obeyed.

We favor the creation of the office of lieutenant-governor of the state, who shall perform the duties of the governor in case of his inability to act.

We favor the abolishment of all useless and unnecessary offices, boards, commissions and clerkships and for a just and economical expenditure of public money.

We are opposed to the pending bill providing for the election of delegates to national conventions of the republican and democratic parties at the expense of the taxpayers. These delegates are not public officials, but are representatives of their respective parties and the taxpayers of the state should not be called upon to pay their railroad fare, hotel bills and other expenses of these trips.

We favor an appropriation by congress placing the Indian war veterans of the Pacific Northwest on an equality with the veterans of the civil war in the matter of pensions.

We favor only such conservation of the public resources as will best develop and settle the country.

We unqualifiedly indorse the administration of President Taft and point with pride to the fulfillment by the national republican party and the pledges contained in its last platform. We point with pride to the history of the republican party and to the capacity of the party, so often demonstrated, to solve public questions and to legislate and administer the government in the interest of the whole people. We affirm our continued loyalty to the principles and policies of the party, and we mutually pledge ourselves to the effort necessary to strengthen the party organization and to put into office men who are loyal to its principles.

HARRIMAN LINES SPENDING MUCH IN OREGON

McMurray Tells of Budget of Company for Present Year

Portland, July 22.—Score one for the "Live Wire" brotherhood of the Portland Commercial club. At the first dinner of this progressive organization, held at the Commercial club, a big railroad announcement that rivals in magnitude any made here in a long time was given out by William McMurray, general passenger agent of the allied Harriman lines in this territory. It told of the Harriman budget for the year, which includes the expenditure of \$2,255,000 on new lines, equipment and betterment.

Mr. McMurray had a real surprise up his sleeve when he went to the dinner. When his time came to speak on the subject, "Steam and More Steam," he waded into statistics and told what his lines are doing now and are going to do for the further development of the Pacific Northwest. Needless to say, his speech made the hit of the dinner and when he finished he was greeted with great applause.

New construction contemplated or already under way was given in the budget as follows: Branch line, Crabtree to Lebanon, 8 miles, to cost \$300,000; Beaverton-Willburg cut-off, 14 miles, \$1,200,000; Natron to Klamath Falls extension, 191 miles, \$9,830,000; Hillsboro to Tillamook, 90 miles, \$3,800,000; Deschutes railroad south to Redmond, 133 miles, \$5,320,000; Lake Creek & Coeur d'Alene, 14 miles, \$700,000; Oregon & Washington tunnel under the peninsula at Portland, 2.7 miles, \$680,000; St. Johns to Troutdale line, 16 miles, \$515,000.

Betterments and new work include O. R. & N. steel bridge at Portland, \$1,640,000; eight steel bridges on Southern Pacific and O. R. & N. lines, \$377,000; new 90-pound steel rails for O. R. & N. and Southern Pacific, \$570,000; 100 miles automatic block signals, \$110,000; line changes and passing tracks, \$910,000; new passenger stations at Grants Pass, Medford, Corvallis, Pendleton, Baker City, Stanfield, Or., and Wallace, Idaho, and new Portland freight house, \$153,000. Total, \$26,255,000.
