WORK ON COTTAGE

GROVE WATER SYSTEM

Cottage Grove, Or., July 22.—Work on Cottage Grove's new water system and pipe line from Layne Creek is being rushed by the contractors and several miles of ditch have been excavated at the Layne Creek end of the line. Two carloads of pipe have arrived and is being taken to the scene of operations today. The reservoir will be constructed by the time the pipe line is completed to the city. The whole system will be completed this year and will assure Cottage Grove an abundant supply of the best water for all purposes for a population several times larger than the city's present size.

HOME INVESTMENTS BEST

Suburban acreage about Eugene is growing in value very fast. Two years ago I offered hill lands in City View Park at \$40 per acre, and very few persons could be induced to buy. Last month I sold this same land at auction, without improvements, for \$105 per acre, and at private sale on long time for \$200 per acre. The future growth of Eugene will soon make it worth \$1000 to \$2000 per acre. Last month I sold Florence acreage by auction for 46 times what it sold for six years previously, and the joke of it is that the buyer resold it within thirty days for eight times what he paid for it, or 368 times what it sold for a little more than six years ago. This experience will be repeated many times in the next few years. Deepening the Shaw bar to eighteen feet will increase its shipping capacity over 400 per cent. If Lane county people, instead of sending their money to Canada and elsewhere for investment would invest it in Eugene and Florence real estate they would make more money and at the same time help develop local interests. Distance may "lend enchantment to the view," but as a money-maker, compared with home investment, it is a fizzle. For an investment near town that is a real money-maker, see the veteran real estate man, Geo. Melvin Miller.

SEATTLE SENDS GISH

TO A. A. U. MEET

Seattle, Wash., July 22.—The board of directors of the Seattle Athletic Club has acted favorably on the plan to send Brailley Gish to the Amateur Athletic Union championship meet to be held in Chicago on August 13, and the local track star will go into training at once. Gish, who holds the world's record for the javelin throw, is one of the best all-around athletes on the Pacific coast, and he will go after the all-around championship of the United States in the Chicago meet. Gish is a sterling performer in the spring for any distance up to the quarter mile, and is strong in the javelin throw and broad jump. He can also put the 16-pound shot a creditable distance, so the greater part of his training will be in tossing the hammer, pole vaulting and hurdling, in which events he has not had much experience.

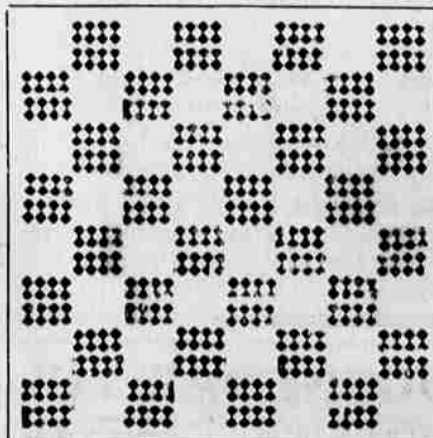
