STILL COMMENTING

ON BIG FIGHT

"As is usually the case," comments The New York Mail, "when the outsider in the betting wins a championship from a popular favorite, there are half a dozen boxers touted as being able to wrest the title from the winner. Jack Johnson is being pestered with challenges from all parts of the world. Everybody seems to have a man that can whip the negro, but all these notoriety seekers had better take a back seat. Johnson could take all of these prospective champions into the ring in the same day and clean 'em up in less than twenty rounds. Johnson is in a class all by himself just at present. Not because he whipped Jeffries, because this was an easy task, but because in the last five years he has been the greatest boxer the world has ever known."

"There are a few other heavy weights who could have whipped Jeffries last Monday afternoon if they had the nerve possessed by the negro. Jeffries was in no condition to fight, and we believe now that one of our ordinary heavies could have done the trick. But we have no intention of rubbing it in. Jeffries has fought his last battle, so let him retire in peace. But we can never forget the mistake that has been made in forcing Jeffries to re-enter the ring. He didn't want to fight a year ago. Jeffries knew then that he was done, but he answered the call of his thousands of admirers and took a chance. Now he has been humiliated and will probably never be seen again in public."

"This was almost criminal, as both Corbett and Choynski could see that Jeffries was not right. These men should have taken the public into their confidence. They should have let the world at large know that Jeffries was not what he ought to be on the eve of battle. The admirers

of the white champion would then have held off in the betting instead of giving big odds to the sure-thing brigade. It was a crime to let the friends of Jeffries wager millions of dollars on a man whom the trainers knew was not fit to battle against the negro Hercules."

JOHNSON IS RECKLESS AGAIN

New York, July 23.—Jack Johnson, the colored champion, must appear in the West Side court today to answer the charge of recklessly driving his automobile, for the "steenth time. This time Jack is mad. He says he is being hounded. The police, he said, deliberately arrested him after being told to "get" him whenever the opportunity offered.

His arrest at Forty-seventh street and Eighth avenues occurred, Johnson said, simply because he was following instructions from Inspector Walsh, who told him after leaving the theater to get away as quickly as he could from the admiring crowds. While he was "getting away" he was pinched. Johnson furnished \$100 bail.

HARNESS RECORD LOWERED AT G. R.

Grand Rapids, Mich., July 23.—The final day of the Grand Rapids harness racing meet was marked by the lowering of the track records for both pacers and trotters. Giftline, who brought the pacing record down to 2:03 3-4 a year ago, today clipped it a full second to 2:02 3-4.

In the first heat of the 2:14 trot, Hailworthy reduced the track record to 2:07 3-4.

Giftline ruled favorite in the 2:03 pace and won in straight heats that grew exciting only at the finish. The Fel was a length behind at the wire in the first heat, while Alben Wilson was beaten by a neck in the second heat.

In the 2:14 trot Willy made history, it being the first time that a foreign trotter had won a heat in less than 2:10. Willy traveled it in 2:08.

LONGFORD WILL BOX KAUFMAN

Philadelphia, July 23.—Arrangements were completed here yesterday for a six-round bout between Sam Langford and Al Kaufman at the Philadelphia National league baseball park on the night of Aug. 10.

Harry Edwards, the promoter, announces that if the weather is unfavorable on that night the bout will be held on the first clear night following. The men will meet at catch weights.

MANAGER LYNCH

Seattle, July 23.—D. E. Dugdale, president of the Seattle club in the Northwestern league, last night accepted the resignation of M. J. Lynch as player-manager and captain of the Seattle team and appointed Fred Weed to fill the vacancy. Lynch is at liberty to sign with any club that may desire his services. He plays center field and his resignation follows two months' unsuccessful effort to give Seattle a winning team.

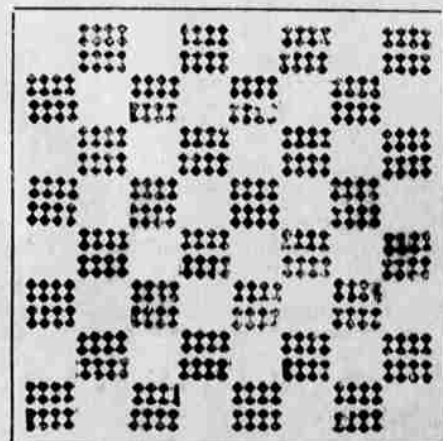
