SEVERAL OUTSIDE AUTOMOBILE PARTIES IN EUGENE SUNDAY

Two From Portland Bound for Crater Lake and One From Los Angeles

Three outside automobile parties spent last night in Eugene, two from Portland, bound for Crater Lake, and one from Los Angeles, bound for Seattle and return. The Portland parties consisted of W. S. Gilbert and wife, Frank Gilbert and wife, Miss Kathleen Burns and Tom Robertson. They are in a Buick and a large six-cylinder Metteson. The two Gilberts and their wives made this same trip last fall, after the rains had begun, and had quite a disagreeable experience, and they are now traveling in the dust rather than mud on the roads and no snow and ice to contend with on the mountains. They report the dust very bad in the valley, especially on the Portland end of the trip. Around Oregon City is the worst place, they say, the dust being "a foot deep," more or less. The roads on the Eugene end of the trip are the best. The Messrs. Gilbert are timbermen, formerly of Duluth, Minn., and are well known throughout Western Oregon on account of their timber interests.

The Los Angeles party consists of R. C. Chambers, a Southern California capitalist, his wife and children, including R. C. Chambers, Jr.

They left Los Angeles 15 days ago and have been traveling indifferently, stopping at Crater Lake and many other places of interest. The party is driven by R. Davidson, chauffeur. He, too, as a party last week reported, says the roads in Oregon through the mountains are better than those in Northern California.

SPRECKLES DECLARES INTERESTS PLAN TO INFLUENCE ELECTIONS

New York, July 25.—Rudolph Spreckels, wealthy son of Claus Spreckels of San Francisco, believes that the "interests" are preparing some dangerous move to injure business temporarily for the benefit of the "standpatters" who want to go back to congress this fall and for the general benefit of all the politicians who have been brought into danger by the spread of insurgency.

Spreckels came back from Europe today on the Kaiserin Auguste Victoria, after having seen many prominent American business men and bankers abroad. And that was the opinion he had gathered from them and from his observation of the course of events in the United States.

"I expect to see the moneyed interests of the country make a very significant move with the purpose of influencing the people before the fall elections," said he. "I believe that they will try to cause a national disturbance of business to frighten the people into returning to office the 'standpatters'."

"However, I think the insurgents will be returned to congress in larger numbers and will indirectly control national legislation. Ultimately, I think the great west, the home of the insurgents, will prove to be the savior of this country from the corruption interests and the politicians they control."

Mr. Spreckels found a much different opinion of American business conditions in Europe from that usually found by American millionaires who go abroad.

Foreigners Watch Closely. "The concentration of wealth in the hands of the few in the United States is considered by foreign business men to be more dangerous than our political legislation," said he. "So long as the great holders of wealth can do as they will this country will be upset financially and foreigners will lack confidence in us. Nevertheless, over there they have a feeling of optimism as regards our future though not our immediate future."

When brought to the subject of direct nominations he said that the people of California had been compelled to accept a second rate measure. This will in the end lead to force a bill that will provide for real direct nominations, Spreckels said.

REAL ESTATE MEN MUST TELL TRUTH

Vancouver, Wash., July 24.—That a real estate dealer has no right to misrepresent property or tell his customer that it is twice as large as it really is, was decided by a jury which returned a verdict for \$1500 for the plaintiff.

John Eckert brought suit against F. A. Rugg and wife and G. S. Smith for \$2500 damages or the difference between the price he paid for certain real estate and the price it was really worth. Eckert said he had been told by the real estate dealer, Smith, that there were forty acres of land in good cultivation, whereas there were only nineteen acres in cultivation.

DEMOCRATIC VOTE FOR O. B. COLQUITT AND PROHIBITION

Austin, Texas, July 25.—Incomplete returns from throughout the state indicate that O. B. Colquitt has been named the democratic nominee for governor of Texas and the plan to submit a state-wide prohibition amendment to a popular vote has carried in the primaries today.

Colquitt, it is certain, has carried northern, southern and western Texas, although R. V. Davidson is running close in the latter section. Returns from the country districts are meagre and may have some effect on the final result. The vote on the prohibition amendment is close and both sides are claiming victory. It will probably be two or three days before the final result of this vote is known. Bascom Thomas has defeated A. D. Davidson for lieutenant governor.

SHORTRIDGE ACQUITTED BY JUDGE BRYSON

Cottage Man Accused of Dumping Sawdust in the River Found Not Guilty

W. C. Shortridge of Cottage Grove appeared in the Eugene justice court today on the charge of dumping sawdust into a stream that flows into the Columbia river. He had quite a number of witnesses on hand to show that he was innocent of the offense, and after hearing the testimony Judge Bryson dismissed the case, deeming the defendant not guilty.

There is a state law against putting sawdust into streams for the reason that it is fatal to fish. Shortridge was arrested over a week ago on this charge, and he claimed at the time that his prosecution was on account of spite work, and his acquittal today vindicates him.

RUNAWAY ACCIDENT IN MOHAWK VALLEY RESULTS IN INJURIES

Arthur Huckaby and Family, of Eugene, Thrown Out and Some of Them Hurt

Arthur Huckaby, an employee of the Eugene Ice & Storage Co., and his family were the victims of a runaway in the Mohawk valley Sunday. They hired a livery rig and drove to Donna on an outing. Upon their return in the afternoon the horse became frightened at something and became unmanageable. Soon the buggy was overturned, precipitating the occupants with considerable force to the ground. Mr. Huckaby escaped injury except for a few bruises, but Mrs. Huckaby, the three-year-old daughter and little baby were not so fortunate. The mother was badly cut on the knee, requiring several stitches to close the wound, the girl suffered a scalp wound over one eye, and the baby received a bad scratch on the face. The rig was near a fence at the time it was overturned and the baby was thrown clear over it into a field.

The buggy was pretty badly damaged and the horse ran nearly to Marcola before it was caught.

Mr. Huckaby soon after the accident telephoned to F. M. Carter, his employer, and the latter sent two physicians up in an automobile. After the wounds had been bandaged the party was brought to Eugene in the machine.

HILL WILL SPEND MANY MILLIONS IN NORTHWEST

Some of the plans of James J. Hill for the expenditure of millions of dollars in the northwest were given out last night by John F. Stevens, who is in charge of the Hill systems in Oregon and who is recognized as the confidential advising engineer of the railroad magnate. Mr. Stevens will leave Portland Monday for St. Paul, Minn., where he will confer with Mr. Hill and for a trip in the east.

One plan disclosed by Mr. Stevens, who for the last week has been on a tour of the Hill lines, especially the Great Northern in Washington, is for the expenditure of approximately \$1,000,000 in bringing the Cascade division of the Great Northern, running from Leavenworth to Everett, Wash., up to the requirements of the interstate commerce commission. The plan contemplates the construction of an extensive system of concrete and frame snowsheds by which the railroad hopes to avoid such disasters as occurred during the last winter—Portland Journal.
