TIMBER FIRE NEAR WENDLING IS SPREADING

Old Blaze Thought to Have
Been Under Control
Breaks Out Afresh

The fire that last week burned dangerously near Wendling but that was thought to be under control, was fanned up again the first of this week and is now burning fiercely over a large area. All the Booth-Kelly crews at Wendling and in the woods nearby have been taken from their work and are fighting the flames, trying to keep them away from the uncut timber. As yet the damage is slight, for the fire has been spending itself over the logged-off areas where it is gaining strength and size among the dead and long dried slashings.

A. C. Dixon went to Wendling yesterday and went into the woods to direct the work and learn the extent of the fire. He has not been heard from since and the officials here do not expect he will get back to Wendling before tonight. The company headquarters here, however, are on the alert for a call for help and a force of men can be shipped up there on a moment's notice.

The strong wind that has come up in the afternoon every day this week spreads the flames faster than the men can control them. They are endeavoring to clear away the burnable material before it in the hope that the fire will die out. The flames are so hot that it is impossible to approach within several hundred yards of them and every green thing in the path is dried up and scorched before the flames reach it. Rain coming within the next twenty-four hours would mean the saving of thousands of dollars and prevent the spread of a dangerous fire.

NEGRO'S NEAR-VICTIM GIVES TESTIMONY

Roseburg, Or., July 27.—The preliminary hearing of S. M. Reynolds, the negro porter who was recently arrested on a Southern Pacific passenger train, accused of an attempted attack on Josephine Moss, the 14-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Moss, of Grants Pass, was held behind closed doors in the local justice court yesterday afternoon. Reynolds was held for the grand jury with bail fixed at \$5000.

Among the state's witnesses were Josephine Moss, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Moss, of Grants Pass, and Sheriff Fenton, of Roseburg. Although somewhat frightened, little Josephine Moss made an excellent witness for the state and the manner in which she related the story of her experience in the sleeping car on the night of the alleged crime astonished the court officers.

The other witnesses simply testified regarding the circumstances following the alleged attack, and in so doing formed a chain of evidence which the prosecuting attorney believes cannot be shattered. The defendant refused to testify.

At the end of the hearing Attorney L. H. Dawley (colored), of Portland, representing the defendant, remarked to friends that he believed his client guilty and for that reason withdrew from the case.

The Pullman Company had a special detective at the trial today, and it is generally whispered that Mr. Moss intends to file a suit for damages against that company. The prosecution was conducted by District Attorney George M. Brown.

If Lane county people, instead of sending their money to Canada and elsewhere for investment would invest it in Eugene and Florence real estate they would make more money and at the same time help develop local interests. Distance may "lend enchantment to the view," but as a money-maker, compared with home investments, it is a fizzle.
