ORDER ISSUED FOR ENCAMPMENT OF O. N. G.

Adjutant-General W. E. Finzer
Sends Out General Orders No. 12

Local officers of the Oregon National Guard today received the orders for the big encampment at American Lake, in Washington, to begin on Aug. 8. The orders are as follows:

General Orders, No. 12.—Headquarters Oregon National Guard, Adjutant-General's Office:

1. The several subdivisions of the Oregon National Guard stationed outside of Portland will leave their home stations en route to Cosgrove, Wash., as follows:

Company A, 3d Infantry, to leave Baker City on train No. 5, Aug. 7, at 8 o'clock p. m.

Company L, 3d Infantry, to leave Pendleton on train No. 5, Aug. 8, at 1:30 o'clock a. m.

Company B, 4th Infantry, to leave Ashland on train No. 16, Aug. 7, at 5:55 o'clock p. m.

Company D, 4th Infantry, to leave Roseburg on train No. 16, Aug. 7, at 11:05 o'clock p. m.

Company E, 4th Infantry, to leave Cottage Grove on train No. 16, Aug. 8, at 1:48 o'clock p. m.

Field and staff, 4th Infantry, to leave Eugene on train No. 16, Aug. 8, at 2:37 o'clock a. m.

Company A, 4th Infantry, to leave Eugene on train No. 16, second section, Aug. 8, at 3:15 o'clock a. m.

Company C, 4th Infantry, to leave Eugene on train No. 16, second section, Aug. 8, at 3:15 a. m.

Company G, 4th Infantry, to leave Albany on train No. 16, second section, Aug. 8, at 5:05 o'clock a. m.

Company M, 3d Infantry, to leave Salem on train No. 16, second section, Aug. 8, at 6:15 o'clock a. m.

Company I, 3d Infantry, to leave Woodburn on train No. 16, second section, Aug. 8, at 8:03 o'clock a. m.

Company J, 3d Infantry, to leave Woodburn on train No. 16, second section, Aug. 8, at 8:03 o'clock a. m.

Company G, 3d Infantry, to leave Oregon City on train No. 16, second section, Aug. 8, at 7:07 o'clock a. m.

Company F, 3d Infantry, to leave McMinnville on train No. 4, Aug. 8, at 7:17 o'clock a. m.

Company H, 4th Infantry, to leave Dallas on train No. 74, Aug. 8, at 6:55 o'clock a. m.

A standard sleeping car will be attached to train No. 16 at Ashland for use of those officers directed to accompany said train.

Train No. 16, second section, will run as a special from Eugene, to which will be attached a baggage car.

2. The first section will leave the Union depot, Portland, over the Northern Pacific railroad Aug. 8 at 7 o'clock a. m., and will consist of one freight car, one stock car, headquarters, band, Companies B, C, E, F, K, 3d Infantry, and ambulance company section.

3. Upon arrival at Cosgrove, Wash., the commanding officers of the 3d and 4th Infantry will report to the camp commander. The commanding officers, ambulance company section and hospital corps detachment, 4th Infantry, to the chief surgeon.

4. The service uniform, khaki, and equipments will be worn.

5. Horses will be allowed as follows: One for each mounted officer, four for orderlies to each commanding officer, 3d and 4th Infantry, and one for orderly to the commanding officer ambulance company section.

6. A per diem of \$1.50 will be allowed to each mount furnished.

7. All camp equipment will be issued to the regimental quartermasters at Portland, Saturday, Aug. 6.

8. State pay will be allowed the United States paying regular army pay, the state paying the difference.

9. Subsistence will be furnished by the United States army.

10. Col. James Jackson, inspector-general, is directed to accompany the troops to Cosgrove, Wash. The expense is necessary in the military service.

11. No expense will be incurred not authorized by this order or directed from these headquarters.

12. Mail matter, telegrams, freight and express should be addressed care Camp of Instructions, Cosgrove, Wash. All mail, telegrams, freight or express matter must show the company and regiment to whom the party belongs.

NEWPORT MURDER MYSTERY BAFFLES

Missing Nols Girl's Sisters
Cannot Identify Bones
Found in the Sack

Newport, Or., July 27.—Although two sisters of Sophia Nols, who disappeared from here Oct. 17, 1904, have viewed the skeleton of a white woman found on the beach, and county officials have followed every line of investigation that promised any results, the gunny sack mystery is as deep tonight as when it was dug from the sand near Williams' dock yesterday morning.

As further corroboration of the theory that the gunny sack mystery is one of murder, Coroner Carter held a second inquest today and the jury returned this verdict: "The remains are those of a white woman aged about 21 years, killed by a blunt instrument which fractured the skull in two places, above the right ear and at the base of the brain. It is evidently a case of murder."

Of that clew which the disappearance of the Nols girl lends the snarl, the only new facts brought out by today's investigations were the rumor that she and her brother-in-law, E. E. Alloway, quarreled shortly before she dropped from sight, and that she first met him at the same time he became acquainted with her sister, while all were working on a ranch.

Mrs. E. A. Alloway of Blodgett, and Mrs. John Gussalus of Jefferson, arrived in Newport today, summoned by the faint hope that the bones might be those of their sister. Both sisters are of the opinion that she committed suicide, a belief generally held here.

Without emotion, they gazed upon the barnacle-remnants of a human being and minutely inspected the looking glass, the scrap of silk, the bottles and cards which were in the gunny sack when John Schlessler of Albany found it. Then they shook their heads. They were unable to identify anything that would indicate that the mass of human wreckage before them was their sister's.

Mrs. Alloway said her sister Sophia had her teeth filled with gold a short time before she went to Newport. The teeth in the grinning skull before her, she said, were not Sophia's.

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PULLMAN PORTER IS BOUND OVER

Roseburg, Or., July 28.—After his preliminary hearing in the justice court yesterday, S. M. Reynolds, the negro Pullman car porter, accused of attempting criminal assault upon 14-year-old Josephine Moss, of Grants Pass, was held under \$5000 bonds to appear before the grand jury next October.

The negro was represented by Attorney Dalley (colored) of Portland. So convincing was the girl's story that Attorney Dalley stated afterward that he would have no further connection with the case—that being his practice when convinced a client is guilty. Detective W. Farley of the Pullman company was also present.

The girl told a straightforward story. The trial was held behind closed doors.

RAWN MYSTERY STILL UNSOLVED

Many New Disclosures Have a Bearing on the Case

Chicago, July 26.—Authorities of Winnetka, who yesterday took possession of the summer residence of the late Ira G. Rawn, president of the Monon railway, were expected tonight to issue a statement that would have an important bearing on the inquest tomorrow evening, but at a late hour it was announced that no statement would be made.

The residence was seized by the president of the Winnetka council, who intimated that vital information was being withheld. He placed Chief of Police Cooty in charge, together with enough policemen to patrol the grounds. Members of the Rawn family are permitted to go and come freely, but they are not permitted to carry away any article and every visitor is subjected to constant espionage.

Chief interest now centres in the inquest tomorrow evening. It had been expected that President Lovett, of the Illinois Central, would arrive today, presumably to attend the inquest, but if he is in the city no trace of him can be found.

Estate Dwindles to \$120,000. Considerable surprise was caused today when it became known that the estate of Ira Rawn, instead of amounting to a million dollars or more, will not exceed \$120,000, and perhaps not more than \$100,000. This estimate does not include the life insurance or casualty insurance of \$135,000, payment of which may be contested unless the companies are convinced that Mr. Rawn did not die by his own hand. Attorneys for the Illinois Central still insist that Mr. Rawn must have had an estate of \$2,000,000, and will want to know what has become of it.

The Pinkertons announce that they are working on a new clew, which they assert may lead to the slayer of Rawn. Two mysterious men arrived in Winnetka on the night of the tragedy and inquired the way to the Rawn home. Neighbors have been found who heard two men arguing in the shrubbery at the Rawn home. One was protesting against some act the other proposed.
