TRAIN RUNS OVER

COTTAGE GROVE MAN

He Was Not Killed Because He Was Under Cattle Guard

Cottage Grove, Or., July 28.—Run over by an Oregon & Southern train two miles east of here at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, William Heath, Jr., was picked up after the accident alive and with no bones broken. He sustained severe wounds on the head and internal hurts, but has a chance of recovery. The entire train passed over him.

Heath was thrown from a carriage under the cattle guard of the locomotive when the horse he was driving shielded at the train. His mother, Mrs. William Heath, and his aunt were also thrown out. They sustained bruises but are not seriously hurt.

The occupants of the carriage did not notice the approach of the train and were almost upon the track when it whizzed down upon them. The carriage was completely wrecked.

FARM HOUSE ON

SILK CREEK BURNED

Monday of last week, just after the noon hour, the farm home of Geo. Gildersleeve, which was located on part of the Elliott place in Silk Creek valley, caught fire and was totally consumed. Mrs. Gildersleeve and the baby were at home alone at the time, and did not discover the flames which started on the roof of the house, near the flue, until it was far beyond control. Mrs. Gildersleeve placed her baby beyond danger and worked vigorously to save the household goods, but only succeeded in saving a few articles, working until she received several bad burns on the arms. The loss is estimated at about \$300, with no insurance.—Cottage Grove Leader.

FAST WORK ON WATER

SYSTEM BRINGS RELIEF

Cottage Grove, Or., July 28.—Work on Cottage Grove's new \$100,000 municipal water system is progressing rapidly, over nine miles of ditch are open, and 3500 feet of pipe are laid a distance of 18 miles east of the city. The water is brought down to each successive blow-off, and furnished to the men at work, clear, pure and cold. Cottage Grove is in great need of water at the present time, there being only about one-fifth the amount of water in the old system necessary for present consumers. City Engineer Kurtz is working on plans to restore the old system to its highest efficiency, and extensions of the new system which will furnish an adequate supply for a population many times larger than that of Cottage Grove.

HAROLD ROUNDS GETS

A NEW POSITION

Popular University Student Is Now Member of Executive Force of Y. M. C. A.

Harold J. Rounds, of Portland, one of the most popular members of the last graduating class of the University of Oregon, has become a member of the executive force of the Portland Young Men's Christian Association. Mr. Rounds has been secured as assistant secretary of the boys' department of the association, under J. C. Clark, head of that department.

Mr. Rounds is one of several students in Oregon colleges who have recently decided to adopt as their life vocation the work of the Y. M. C. A. During his student days he was active in a club for high school boys conducted by a group of students at the University of Oregon. Last winter he represented that institution in the state oratorical contest, held at Salem, in which he took second place.

ATTEMPTS MURDER,

KILLS HIMSELF

Portland, Or., July 28.—Benjamin Stanton, 25 years of age, shot and killed himself while in the rear of his home at 1026 East Thirteenth street North, at 11 o'clock Monday night after he had made a futile attempt to kill his wife and George Hansen, her brother, by firing five bullets at them. Stanton died almost instantly from the self-inflicted wounds near his heart.

Stanton and his wife have been married four months. Since their marriage they have quarrelled frequently. Their quarrels led to their separation recently. Shortly after 10 o'clock last night Stanton went to his home and endeavored to effect a reconciliation without avail. When his wife adjourned to the street with her young brother she started to walk away and turned a deaf ear to his entreaties.

Then Stanton whipped out a .38-caliber revolver and while standing within a few paces of his wife and her brother he shot. The bullets went wide and they escaped unhurt.

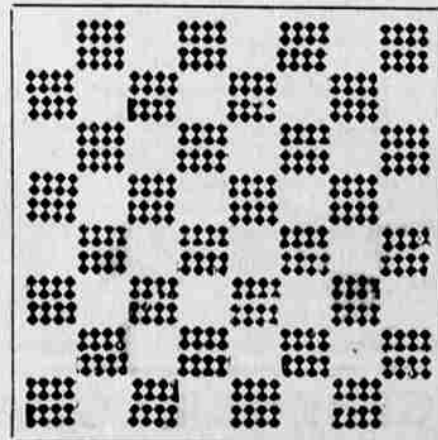
