TRAINED AT YALE

New Haven, Conn., July 28.—Jack Johnson admitted yesterday to a New Haven man that he formerly lived in this city. He was janitor in a cigar store here and got a start toward the world's heavy weight championship by coaching from Sid Coe, a Yale colored football and rowing trainer, who gave Johnson his first ideas of scientific conditioning and who put the colored giant physically on his feet. Between times in keeping Sanford's poolroom on Congress avenue clean and sweeping it out Johnson practiced boxing.

JACK JOHNSON CAN'T

RACE IN INDIANAPOLIS

Indianapolis, July 28.—Much discussion today follows the action of the Indianapolis speedway motor management in refusing to allow Jack Johnson, the colored champion, to participate in the races in September.

Indianapolis has a large negro population, and the turning down of

Johnson is the big topic of conversation among the blacks. While the colored people here are inclined to resent the action of the speedway management, leading white citizens are commending the decision. Johnson applied for a place on the track during the recent meet, but his entry was refused. He then asked to be allowed to make an exhibition race during September, which the directors also refused.

LEGAL SIDE OF

FIGHT PICTURES

Chicago, July 28.—In giving his opinion that the Mayor and Chief of Police have the right to stop the exhibition of the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures, Corporation Counsel Brundage cites the so-called "block case" which was carried to the supreme court of Illinois and in which, in writing the court's opinion, Chief Justice Cartwright declared that pictures depicting the adventures of the "James Boys" and the activities of "night riders" were immoral. Counsel for A. J. Jones, who owns the Illinois rights to the pictures, yesterday declared that in all probability court proceedings would be instituted today to force the city officials to grant the permit.

SAYS RAILROAD

WAS HEADED

TOWARD EUGENE

R. R. McKinney, of Holley, author of several Albany booster writeups in pamphlet and Sunset, wishes a visit from Albany business men, and in a letter to Manager Struble says:

"Albany will never become such a city as it dreams of becoming until the eastern end of this county is developed. The cities to the north and south of you have the same dreams and have nearly as great opportunities; each must develop its own territory first. You may not know, but until the present there has been greater activity in Eugene looking to a railroad up the Calapooia, than there has been in Albany. I was informed credibly last year that Eugene had subscribed \$41,000 toward a railroad project on condition that Eugene be made the terminus instead of Browns ville. I believe that if the promoters had done their part and obtained this right-of-way this road would now be in operation and Eugene would now be in a position to command the trade of this valley and would have stolen a spoke out of your 'hub.' It is the most important matter that confronts Albany today—this railroad, its effect in the settlement of this valley. It affects every foot of property in your city and every mercantile and commercial interest."

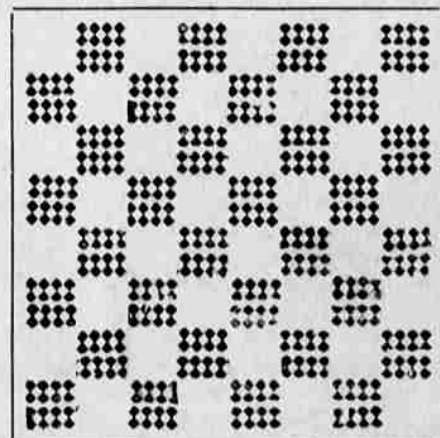
