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### STEEL TRUST'S WATERED STOCK

In a speech at Olathe, Kansas, the other day, Senator Cummins, of Iowa, an irrepressible insurgent, took occasion to say a few things about the trusts. Referring to the benevolent Andrew Carnegie, who bestows a new library on the dear people every day, Senator Cummins said:

You will remember that in 1901 the Carnegie Company, of Pittsburgh, sold its plant to the United States Steel Co., organized that year. The steel Corporation paid the Carnegie Company \$500,000,000 for its plant and business. Of this incomprehensible sum Andrew Carnegie received \$65,000,000 in the bonds of the corporation, and his associates in business received the remainder. What was the plant worth? That is not a subject longer in dispute. It has been minutely investigated.

The highest value any reasonable man would put on it in 1901 was \$80,000,000, and the United States Steel Corporation paid to Andrew Carnegie & Co. \$420,000,000 more than it was worth, more than would be required to reproduce it with every modern improvement known to the business. Now, why did the United States Steel Co. pay \$420,000,000 more for this property than it was worth? I will tell you. It examined the books of the Carnegie Steel Company and there it was shown that over a series of years the Carnegie Company had been making profits that would pay interest on \$500,000,000, and the United States Steel Corporation has enough confidence in its own power, enough confidence in the friendship of men like Dalzell, of Pennsylvania; and Payne, of New York; and Aldrich, of Rhode Island; and Hale, of Maine; and Lodge, of Massachusetts, to be sure that in the years to come it would be able to earn interest upon the \$500,000,000 it was then paying to the Carnegie Steel Company. This is the sole secret of that transaction.

Senator Cummins then told of the company's reorganization with a capital of \$1,500,000,000. He said \$800,000,000 of this capitalization is pure water, and only this week the steel trust paid its regular fat quarterly dividend on this stock, even if it is

composed mainly of water. Prosperity is certainly rampant in this country—and especially as far as those trusts are concerned which were popularly supposed to have been "busted" into smithereens during the strenuous administration of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt.

The city council should see that no time is wasted in formally settling the Oregon Electric franchise matter. We believe the members of the council are unanimous in their desire to give the Hill railway every possible consideration, and in this position they are backed up by 90 per cent of the people of Eugene.

If all these bribery stories emanating from Illinois are true, the Democratic members of the legislature there bring the highest market price. The adoption of a direct primary law, with its Statement No. 1, would probably cause a slump in the current quotations.

Judge Lind's voice may lack the entrancing sweetness of the famous Jenny Lind's, but just now his coy "yes" would fall like heavenly music on the straining ears of Minnesota Democrats.

Oregon Electric surveyors are running the line south from Albany. Hill's coming means a greater Eugene, and a more populous and prosperous Willamette valley.

The International bridge over the Rio Grande at El Paso fell with a loaded street car today—and yet President Taft passed over safely only a few months ago.

Down with Statement No. 1! What right has an ordinary American to express any opinion as to his choice for United States senator, anyway?

a pilot here Sunday morning. The Laurentie, aboard of which is Inspector Dew of Scotland Yard, entered the St. Lawrence and should pass here late this afternoon. The provincial police understand that Dew will land here and wait for the Montrose. If Crippen should prove to be aboard the Montrose the arrest will be made by the Quebec provincial police.

Want Honor of Arrest. Father Point, Quebec, July 29.—The Laurentie, with Inspector Dew aboard, is expected between 3 and 4 o'clock this afternoon. There is some conflict as to whether the arrest of Crippen will be made by the dominion authorities or provincial police, both being jealous of the honor of making the arrest, but as Dew will have to identify the suspected couple it would appear as if he would have the say as to who should lay hands on the fugitives, or at least exert much influence in the matter.
