RAILROAD SCHEME

Promoters Ask Local People to
Subscribe for the
Bonds

To begin construction work within sixty days from this date upon a standard gauge electric railway line between Roseburg and Coos Bay is the announced purpose of the Coos Bay Traction Corporation, whose principal officers were in this city today, says the Roseburg Review. This corporation has an authorized capital of \$1,000,000, and its officers are: Geo. T. Averill, president; W. P. Evans, secretary and manager; J. B. Campbell, treasurer and manager; J. H. Robinson, chief engineer and manager; J. H. Somers, vice president and manager of real estate department. All these gentlemen were here today except Mr. Campbell. The articles of incorporation of this company were filed with the secretary of state in Salem, Or., on July 25. The incorporators named were: Geo. M. Perrien, Geo. F. Averill, W. B. Campbell, A. T. Harding and W. P. Evans. They announce that they have no connection with the movement of Messrs. Clark and Halnes for building a steam road from Coos Bay to Roseburg or any other point. This is to be an electric road and has no connection in any other way with the S. P. company or other railroad company now operating in this state.

On the same subject, the Roseburg News says: Asked regarding the financial institution above mentioned, Mr. Averill said that it operated under the title of The Marine Trust and Savings Bank of San Francisco, and was considered one of the strongest banking institutions in the United States. This bank, says Mr. Averill, will accept a large portion of the bonds, perhaps the entire issue of \$1,000,000.

Asked relative to the necessary right of ways, Mr. Averill said that they would be obtained without difficulty, inasmuch as the people owning property between Roseburg and the Coos Bay country will be only too glad to contribute their aid in the event the construction of the road is assured.

It is the intention of the promoters

to commence the solicitation of local capital at once, and it is the opinion of those interested that at least \$250,000 in bonds will be accepted by Roseburg people.

Of course, the remaining \$750,000 bonds will necessarily have to be subscribed by the residents of Marshfield in making up the required total of \$1,000,000.

In order to get down to business at once the promoters issued the following declaration this morning, which is self-explanatory: "Subscription blanks can be obtained at any of the Roseburg banks with full information, and it is now up to the Roseburg public to show their faith and get busy in earnest."

The promoters contend that as soon as \$500,000 in bonds have been sold locally, in Roseburg and Coos Bay, the remaining \$500,000 will be available. In the event such is a fact, it behooves the citizens to take up the proposition in earnest and lend whatever aid possible in bringing the project to a live realization.

Mr. Averill expects to leave Roseburg in a few days, or at least just as soon as he can arrange matters connected with building the road.

He declares that the present proposition merits the closest investigation, and brands it as the only legitimate offer that has been made to those interested in a connecting line between Roseburg and the coast for years. He says "It will be built" in the event the Roseburg and Marshfield people show their faith in the project by accepting bonds in the sum of \$500,000.

OPPOSE ISSUE OF

MORE BONDS FOR SIUSLAW PROJECT

Andrew Jackson, representing the Siuslaw port commission, was in Cottage Grove on Saturday, having come hither from Lorane, where he was getting signatures to a petition asking the commission to bond in the improvement of the Siuslaw bar, says the Cottage Grove Sentinel. The company pledged itself not to bond the district in an amount exceeding \$100,000, but inasmuch as the government has offered to appropriate \$215,000 provided the district will raise a like amount, the commission has undertaken to relieve itself from its pledge by securing signatures to the petition mentioned. The citizens of the lower Siuslaw are favorable to the proposition, but those of the Lorane valley, who derive comparatively little benefit from the proposed improvement, oppose the measure and refused to sign.

COOS BAY IMPROVEMENTS WILL COST \$350,000

Marshfield, Or., July 29.—That the government dredge Oregon is to be brought back to Coos Bay soon is the information which is given local people from the government engineer's office at Portland. Coos Bay has an appropriation of \$50,000 from congress which is now available, and this money will be used to operate the dredge. The channel will be deepened and shoals in the bay removed. In addition to what will be done by the government dredge the port commission is planning extensive improvements. There will be submitted to a vote of the people at the fall election a proposition to deepen and widen the channel of the entire harbor, to improve the river tributary to the bay and to purchase sites for public docks. It is estimated that this work will cost about \$300,000, and it is proposed to issue bonds in that amount to defray the expenses.

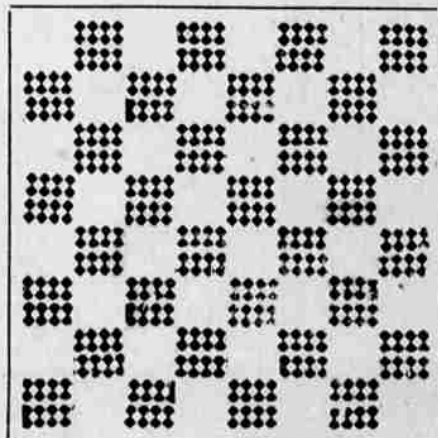
