FROM \$2,000,000 TO 25 CENTS FATE OF YOUTH

George W. Mulligan Jr. Weds a Show Girl and Forfeits His Inheritance

New York, July 30.—Having married a show girl, Bessie Vanness of "The Beauty Spot," against the wishes of his millionaire father, Geo. W. Mulligan Jr., has finally broken with his father, his sister and an inheritance of \$2,000,000. Tonight he left for Detroit to work in an automobile factory and to demonstrate that "I am quite capable of supporting my own wife," and that although "money is desirable, love is the only thing worth while."

"My wife will wait here till I have earned money enough to send her a ticket to Detroit," he said today. "I have no more hope of a reconciliation with my father. Even if I gave her up, which I will never do, I doubt if he would take me back as a son even if I would go."

His Income Reduced.
"We broke completely on Thursday. After working in a garage he controls for \$25 a week and then being reduced to \$18 a week and then being told he could no longer pay that, he made arrangement with my cousin, who manages the garage, to hand me \$1 on every night for my room rent in the Bartholdi and \$1 every morning for my meals."

"I could not keep myself and wife on this. She had been out in the country visiting friends. When she came back I went to my father and asked for some money."

"Didn't you get your \$1 this morning?" he asked me. "I begged for another dollar. At last he gave me a quarter that was the limit."

"Perhaps if your father saw her he would like her," was suggested to young Mulligan.

"Oh, I've tried to bring them together and this is what happened. I took her out to Morris Plains where father lives. We drove up in a station cab. He and my sister were sitting on the veranda. I introduced my wife and my father shook her by the hand and looked pleased. But up jumps my sister. Going indoors she calls to father and leads him upstairs. There, getting into a room, she turns the key, locks him in, then comes down and from the middle of the stairs orders us off the premises."

BOY DROWNED IN UMPQUA RIVER

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 1.—Ross Rogers, 14 years of age, was drowned while swimming in the Umpqua river about two miles west of the city, shortly after 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

According to Marion Parsons, a messenger boy, who was the only eye-witness to the tragedy, Rogers was out even to such as calling for help, he sank to the bottom and never came up.

Parsons believes that his companion was seized with cramps, inasmuch as he apparently made no struggle to save himself. Late last night the body had not been recovered. Rogers resided with his parents at Sutherlin, twelve miles north, and came to this city Friday to visit friends.

If the body is recovered it will be taken to Sutherlin for burial. Today's drowning is the fifth to occur in Douglas county this summer.

INSANE MOTHER DROWNS CHILDREN IN BATH TUB

Antioch, Cal., July 30.—One after another four children were drowned in a bath tub by their mother. Two older children tried to prevent the murder, but the woman went about her ghastly work in a strange, calm manner and with strength, as she thought she was called to make sacrifice to some unknown power. She took her arrest in the same quiet spirit, gazing calmly at her husband as he struggled with the agony of coming from work to find the babies dead.

The woman was Mrs. Joseph Mello, the wife of a ranchman, and she was tired out looking at the brown hills that shut in her home. She said she was afraid she was losing her mind and feared the children would inherit her insanity.

After the husband left home this morning she set about with her terrible task. She filled a large washtub with water and gathered the children into the kitchen. Bernal and Vernal, 5-months old twins, were the first to go. They put up their arms to go to their mother trustingly and were sent out of the world with little struggle.

INDIAN LOVER KILLS TWO, THEN SHOTS HIMSELF

Toledo, Or., Aug. 1.—As a result of a shooting affair at the Siletz Indian reservation, nine miles north of Toledo, yesterday, three Indians are dead—two murdered and one a suicide. The dead are Mrs. Martha Metcalf, aged 38; John Spencer, aged 41; and Robert Felix, aged 39.

According to reports Mrs. Metcalf, who was divorced from her husband, has been living with Felix. It is said that Spencer, who is a married man, has also been paying her attention. Today Felix, on going over to Spencer's place, found the Metcalf woman and Spencer there together, whereupon he pulled out his gun and shot them, killing both. The murderer then mounted his horse and rode over to his place on this side of the river; going into the house, he laid down on the bed, and taking his revolver in his left hand, placed the muzzle in his mouth and pulled the trigger with his right hand, blowing the top of his head off.

The shooting occurred at about the noon hour, and immediately on being notified of the shooting, Sheriff Ross and Deputy Sheriff McElwain started for Siletz.

ALDRICH WILL BUILD NEW \$300,000 HOME

New York, Aug. 1.—Senator N. W. Aldrich has awarded contracts here for the erection of a country home to cost more than \$300,000 on his property at Warwack Neck, R. I. It will be a three-story structure, nearly 300 feet in length and will be of the old-fashioned country home type. The house will be built overhanging the water.


