MURDER MYSTERY STILL UNSOLVED

Suspicion Points Strongly in a
Certain Direction,

Local citizens who saw the sack of bones found at Newport were at the inquest and followed the proceedings and examinations are inclined to think a case could be made out of the circumstantial evidence adduced. Physicians said there was no question about the person having been killed by blows on the back of the head, causing the fractures so plainly visible in the skull. The sisters of the Nola girl who gave evidence at the inquest confided somewhat in their answers and were not in any sense satisfactory witnesses. The mother of the Nola girl could not identify the remains but was not sure the remains were not those of her daughter. Her difficulty seemed to be in not recognizing the hair. The Nola girl had reddish brown hair, and while that found in the sacks was of that color, it was somewhat darker than the mother thought her girl's hair was. The assistant prosecuting attorney feels that there is not sufficient evidence to make a case, but it is possible that other evidence may develop yet.—Corvallis Times-Gazette.

OLDFIELD AND JOHNSON TO RACE

Allentown, Pa., July 31.—Barney Oldfield is ready to accept Jack Johnson's challenge for an automobile race for \$5000.

He said today: "I notice in today's New York papers a challenge issued by Jack Johnson to race for \$5000 over the Brighton Beach track. Ordinarily, I would not make reply until I knew the challenge was authentic, but the New York promoters wired me today asking if I would race him. Automobile racing is my business, and if Johnson or any other man in the world has \$5000 to bet he can beat me at my game I am ready to race."

"Johnson defeated a white champion pugilist and if he thinks he can take the measure of the automobile champion and is willing to put up his money, I won't draw any color line. I will race him for the same reason Jeffries fought him—for the money it will bring me. I will go to New York from Philadelphia tomorrow to negotiate with the promoters."

LOGS FROM FOREST RESERVE SOLD TO MILLS

Cottage Grove, Or., Aug. 1.—The three-mile extension of the Oregon & Southeastern railroad from its terminus to the government timber reserve will probably be completed by Sept. 1, when lumber and log shipments will be made from that newly-opened section. The Fir Lumber company of this city recently purchased 175,000,000 feet of standing timber from the government and will construct a mill of 100,000 feet capacity in the reserve. Under the agreement with the government this timber must be removed within five years, and realizing their inability to do this, at their own mills, the managers have arranged to supply other mills along the Oregon & Southeastern road and mills in Cottage Grove and Eugene.

GOOD PRICES PAID FOR LAND AT COTTAGE GROVE

Cottage Grove, Aug. 1.—Real estate transfers in city property are numerous and the large tracts of land which have been held in this locality by individuals are constantly being divided into small tracts, and sold to homeseekers from other states. Recently the 113-acre farm of Mr. Sanford, seven miles from Cottage Grove in the Bon River valley, was sold to Dr. McKarg, of Chico, Cal., at \$55 an acre, and 200 acres of the Felix Currin farm of 750 acres, three miles from here, was purchased by John Cooley of this place, the consideration being \$10,000. This is considered one of the best farms in this section.

While the launch Queen was on the way down the river from Mapleton with a scow in tow, she became disabled from some cause Tuesday when near Aome. The steamer Hazel came along soon after and brought both the launch and scow to Florence.

The Queen was ready for her trip to Mapleton in the afternoon.

The officers of the Eugene, Elmira & Florence Telephone Co. have appointed D. E. Severy an collector and business manager of the line from Lake Creek to Florence in place of Chas. Saubert.

The railroad gang employed by the Lane County Asset Co. are now working near the mouth of Wildcat creek. They will look after the route to Mapleton by way of Knowles creek and Turner Creek.—West.

RAILROAD MASS MEETING AT FLORENCE

Members of Lane County Asset Company Talk to Sius-law People

A mass meeting of the people of Florence and vicinity was held in the Odd Fellows' hall yesterday (Thursday) to consider matters in connection with the proposed railroad from Eugene, and to listen to the proposition of the Lane County Asset Co. on that subject, says the Florence West.

On account of the farmers being busy there was not as many present from the surrounding country as would otherwise have attended, but those present showed a great deal of interest in the proposition.

Addresses were made by Geo. Melvin Miller, M. Svarverud, J. M. Shelly, F. A. Rankin and John Baird of the Lane County Asset Co. in regard to the benefits to be derived from a railroad, giving some of the plans of the company, and urging our people to subscribe for stock in the corporation. They gave an outline of the work that has been done, and showed that the route is a good one. Though it was stated that they could not say positively that it will be done, several of the speakers referred to Hill in a way that gave the impression that the Hill interests are friendly to the undertaking, and that they may later on, take up the project and complete the road. They are not asking for a bonus but are anxious to secure subscriptions for stock.

Remarks were made by Wm. M. Brynd, Frank Knowles and Rev. T. A. Yost in favor of the railroad.

Mr. Svarverud in behalf of the company thanked the people for the invitation given them to visit Florence, and the meeting adjourned.

EUGENE P. O. CLERK GETS SALARY RAISE

Washington, Aug. 1.—Postmasters at Baker City and Medford have asked the postmaster-general to designate their offices as postal savings banks.

The Roseburg National bank, the Stockgrowers and Farmers' National bank of Wallawa, and the First National bank of Ashland have asked to be made depositories for postal funds.

The postoffice department has raised the pay of 38 mail clerks in Oregon, including 28 at Portland. The Portland raises are: Seventeen clerks from \$600 to \$800; one from \$800 to \$900; three from \$900 to \$1000; two from \$1000 to \$1100; five from \$1100 to \$1200.

Others raised are: Albany, one each from \$600 to \$800, and from \$1000 to \$1100; Ashland, one from \$600 to \$800; Eugene, one from \$1000 to \$1100; McMinnville, two from \$600 to \$800; Roseburg, two from \$600 to \$800; Salem, two from \$1100 to \$1200.
