UNIVERSAL PEACE CONGRESS

Men and women of nearly every nationality, color and language, but animated by a common humanitarian motive, the abolition of war, met in Stockholm, the Swedish capital, today to inaugurate the eighteenth universal peace congress. The deliberations of the friends of peace will continue through the first five days of the week.

Although primarily a convention of delegates from the five hundred peace societies now in existence in various parts of the world, the congress has also enrolled representatives of trade and labor unions, churches, civic and philanthropic societies and educational institutions. It was originally intended to hold the eighteenth congress in that city last year, but it was postponed because of a strike which threatened to develop into a civil war.

Among those scheduled to deliver addresses are Baroness Von Suttner, of Austria, and Signor Moneta, of Italy, both recipients of the Nobel peace prize; the eloquent Senator La Fontaine of Belgium, Joseph G. Alexander of England, and Professor Quidde, of Germany.

Topics to be considered during the congress include the effect of the probable establishment of an arbitral court of justice, the possibility of an international agreement for the limitation of armaments, as foreshadowed in former President Roosevelt's Nobel address; the immunity from capture of mer-

chant ships at sea in time of war, a measure that would do away with the necessity of naval protection for commerce, and therefore greatly reduce armaments; the removal from the category of war of questions of national honor, and the growing demand for treaty provisions pledging the nations not to take territory from each other by conquest.

VOICE ACROSS THE SEA

Successful experiments with a telephone cable across the English channel have given rise to the belief among telephone experts that telephone communication may be established between England and America. The new cable extends from Dover to Cape Gris Nez, and is the first of its kind to be laid in tidal waters.

The fact that long distance telephone conversation cannot be carried on for 3000 miles on land is said to be no proof that telephone communication cannot be established across the sea. On land there are many connections and obstructions that cannot exist under water. Trees and rocks, to say nothing of the storms, often interfere seriously with continuous connections. Whether the human voice can actually be transmitted under the conditions incident to an undersea telephone cable is yet to be demonstrated.

The establishing of the telephone communication between London and New York would be a step forward in the world of cable connections second only to the establishing of the telegraphic connections established half a century ago. Nations and continents would be placed in still closer proximity to one another because of the more direct method of communication, and the results would be of tremendous importance to all the world.

SUES FOR DIVORCE AND STORE BUILDING

Mrs. Eva M. Lemon Asks Legal Separation from Bert Lemon, Donna Merchant

A sequel to the attachment of Bert Lemon's general store at Donna a short time ago and his subsequent disappearance, is a divorce suit filed against him in the circuit court today by Mrs. Lemon's attorney, Wm. G. Martin.

Mrs. Lemon states that they were married in Marcola on April 12, 1903, and have two minor children, Bernice, aged 6 years, and Estol (Jack), aged 4. She asks for the custody of the children.

The plaintiff alleges that her husband was cruel to her, often getting drunk and striking her, besides calling her vile and indecent names. Further, she says, he left her on July 19, 1910, with the store at Donna in the hands of creditors, which further caused her mental anguish. Besides asking for a decree of divorce and for the custody of the children, Mrs. Lemon asks that the court decree her as the owner of the store building and fixtures, as her husband has given her a bill of sale for them.
