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WHISKEY CAUSE OF SILETZ INDIAN KILLING

Illicit Sale of Intoxicants Will be Stopped by the Government

Newport, Or., Aug. 5.—Startling evidence of illegal sale of bad whiskey to Indians around Newport by white men who for many months are said to have been conducting a thriving traffic almost without attempt at concealment, has been brought to light through the investigation by government agents of the triple tragedy on the Siletz reservation a week ago, when Bob Felix shot and killed John Spencer and Martha Metcalf in a drunken brawl, and then turned his weapon against himself.

Dr. Leo J. Frachtenberg, etymologist for the Smithsonian Institution, who is making the investigation for the government, from sworn statements of many Indians has traced responsibility for the shooting to the door of bootleggers who gave liquor to the Indians, in direct violation of the United States statutes. A particularly strong case has been made out against Gus Olson of Toledo, who, according to the testimony of many Indians on the reservation, has sold them whiskey whenever they wanted it and could pay him the price.

Buys Whiskey in Barn.
According to testimony gathered by Dr. Frachtenberg, Olson sold three bottles of whiskey to John Spencer the night before he was killed by Felix. Between the time when he is alleged to have bought the whiskey and the murder, Spencer and his wife were drunk and quarrelsome, and it is now the theory of the United States agent that Felix was attacked by the others while sober, and had to shoot in self-defense. Olson has been in trouble several times for selling liquor illegally.

Fully a dozen Indians have testified against Olson in the hearing at the Siletz agency in the last two days. Several other white men are implicated by the evidence. More than one saloon man in Newport is also involved. While the saloonmen were careful never to sell liquor openly to the Indians, it is said some of them have been habitually selling it through "go-betweens."

Sellers to Be Prosecuted.
"We are tired of the intoxication among the Indians on the reservation and will see that the men against whom we have the evidence of selling liquor to them are brought up before the circuit court at its next term," said Indian Agent Egbert. "Dr. Frachtenberg has been very successful in obtaining valuable evidence. By punishing the present offenders we hope to make examples that others will not care to imitate."

"Bob Felix was sober when he shot John Spencer and Martha Metcalf in the presence of Mrs. Spencer last Saturday," said Dr. Frachtenberg. "John Spencer and his wife were drunk and Martha Metcalf probably had had some liquor. Felix and Martha Metcalf went to Spencer's to get some furniture and a drunken row took place. I believe the trouble was caused by the Spencers offering whiskey to Martha. I think the evidence I have collected will show that the three fought Felix, who was forced in self-defense to shoot."

Toledo Man Is Accused.
"The bottle of whiskey which caused the Spencer trouble was sold to Spencer by Gus Olson in his barn at Toledo the night before the triple tragedy," Mrs. Spencer has furnished the facts and her statement is substantiated by the evidence of others. "Mrs. Spencer's sworn statement to the government officers is in part as follows:

"Friday night, July 29, my husband, John Spencer, and Joseph Gay came to the house. It was late at night. John had three bottles of whiskey. I asked him where he got them, and he said, 'Mamma, I got them from Gus Olson in Toledo, Or.' When he went to Toledo he took with him \$10. He brought back only \$5. "One of the three bottles we drank out in the house. We took another bottle to Tipton's house and drank it there. The last bottle we drank Saturday morning. I know that these bottles came from Gus Olson because we lived in Toledo quite a while and because I know the brand of whiskey Gus Olson is selling. The bottle which I am showing you and which I myself marked with two pencil crosses my husband bought from Gus Olson in Toledo in my presence Friday two weeks ago. My husband paid \$1.50 for it. Gus Olson sold him this bottle right in his barn and I was there and saw the whole transaction."

Claybourne Arden, another Indian, swears he has at different times bought 25 bottles of whiskey from Olson. The liquor was of such vile make that even the Indian could not stand it and ceased buying, he says.

WANT TO KEEP

JOHNSON AND WOMAN OFF NEW YORK STREETS

New York, Aug. 5.—Alleging that the white woman whom Jack Johnson calls his wife was never married to the colored champion, but that his real wife was driven from his Chicago home to make room for the present woman, the Morning Telegraph urges the police to stop Johnson's motoring through the streets with her. The exhibition, the paper declares, is subversive to the morals of New York and should be a matter of police regulation.

The paper charges that Johnson's real wife, who he married in Australia, and who, though very light, is said to have a trace of negro blood, was driven from his home some months ago. The white woman whom he took home with him was later installed in his training quarters in San Francisco and at Reno, the paper charges. The Telegraph asks whether "the moving pictures of the battle between Jeffries and Johnson are more vitiating than the spectacle of Johnson in real life parading the streets in an automobile."

FIRST BASEBALL IN

OREGON IN 1856

Medford, Or., Aug. 5.—R. Stinnett, a resident of Medford, claims the distinction of being the original baseball fan of Oregon. He organized in 1856 the first baseball team in Oregon, at Corvallis.

"In those days," he said "we whittled our own bats from native wood and at first played with a rubber ball. No, it wasn't 'town ball' we played. If you ever caught a rubber ball barehanded when it was coming swift you know how they sting."

"We discarded the rubber ball and made a yarn ball with a chunk of rubber in the center and then covered it with buckskin. The first effort was a little crude, but we soon learned the trick."

"That ball was the most valuable piece of property belonging to the club. If in playing in open fields, as we did in those days, the ball was 'lost,' the game was called until the players, spectators and even the umpire had searched until they found it."

"There were no mits, no masks, no breast-protectors in those days. We went out barehanded in shirt sleeves and overalls and took them as they came."

"I haven't missed a ball game in any place where I've lived all this time, and I don't intend to miss one as long as I am able to get to them. The game has changed since my playing days, but the basic principles are still the same, and it renews my youth to see the youngsters working on the field."

TY COBB PASSES

HARRY LAJOIE

Tyrus Cobb, whom Charles Comiskey says is "a player without a weakness and the greatest baseball player who ever wore spikes," has passed the mighty Larry Jajoie in batting and in the semi-official averages now leading the American league with .375. The Frenchman has fallen down so that in the same number of times at bat he has made eight less hits and has an average of only .365. The averages include up to last Friday's games, and Snodgrass is leading the Nationals with .367, but in the two days following he clouted the ball for keeps and tied up with Cobb at .382.

FRANTIC FATHER

RACES AFTER TRAIN

BEARING SICK SON

Parent Taking Invalid Child to Consult New York Specialists Accidently Left at Logansport, Ind., by Pennsylvania Train — Road Officials Provide Special Train and Boy Is Recovered After Mile-a-Minute Chase and With But Little Delay.

Logansport, Ind., Aug. 2.—That the frantic cries of a father left behind by a train bearing his sick and almost dying son are more powerful than barrels of money was demonstrated here in a recent incident on the Pennsylvania lines.

According to the story, which has just leaked out in Logansport railroad circles, Mr. P. Goodman, St. Joe, Mo., was on train No. 20 on the Pennsylvania lines from Chicago to New York. He had with him a very sick son, about five years of age, whom he was taking to New York for the purpose of consulting a specialist.

At Logansport, Mr. Goodman left the train and went a short distance from the depot to purchase some fruit for the boy, who was left lying in a berth in a sleeping car. The Pennsylvania train No. 20 makes but a short stop at Logansport, and as the father unfortunately went too far, the train left without him. When he returned to the station and found that the train bearing his sick and perhaps dying son had gone, Mr. Goodman was almost frantic. He told his sad story to the depot master who immediately got in touch with the division superintendent of the Pennsylvania lines. A special engine and coach were pressed into service and orders to hold No. 20 train at Bunker Hill, a station 16 miles beyond Logansport.

The anxious father was rushed over the sixteen mile stretch of track at the rate of a mile a minute. The entire proceeding was carried through with such speed that the fast train was delayed but a trifle more than 25 minutes. The engine and coach were provided without extra cost to Mr. Goodman.

"I have been traveling on the Pennsylvania lines for more than fifteen years," said a veteran commercial traveler at a local hotel today. "and I have always remarked that the employees of the road do their work as if their hearts were made of the right sort of stuff."

"The conductor who goes out of his way to find a seat for a tired woman—and you see such instances every day on the Pennsylvania—is just as much of a hero as the division superintendent who provided a special train for a grief-stricken father."

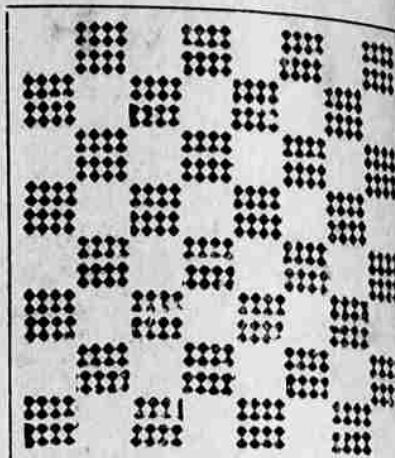
